a minimum of equipment," stated In-
spector Pountney, who two years ago
brought radio was something that
brought Amos 'n' Andy over the air.
Today the Inspector talks notchal-
antly and intelligently about "skips,
inductions, resistance, ultra-high fre-
quencies, modulations and phases" among
other things.

"A fully equipped car for police
work may cost \$1,000," he went on to
explain. "Put two men in it and
they can drive around all day and
perhaps never catch an offender or
even report an occurrence.

"But for \$100 more we can install
a radio receiver. Those men are then
available at any time to go anywhere.
We can converge several cars to a
given spot in two minutes. And in-
variably they get their man. That's
why I say the cost of administering
justice has been reduced."

Offenders charged by police in pa-
trol and cruise cars were invariably
caught either in the act of commit-
ting the offense or immediately after-
ward, he explained.

to me," Mr. Mavor immediately wired
Ottawa stating the circumstances and
recommending the appointment. With-
in 48 hours the young Calgary law-
yer was appointed district judge.
Mr. Mavor who has since risen to
be one of the leaders of the Alberta
Bar, is personal counsel for Premier
Aberhart. A couple of years ago Mr.
Mavor was discussed as Attorney-
General in the Aberhart Cabinet, but
he decided to stick to his profession.
While at the present time Mr. Mavor
does not seem to be so enthusiastic
in regard to all the performances of
the Aberhart government, at the same
time he states that it is surprising
how strongly Premier Aberhart's par-
ty is entrenched in the Province of
Alberta. He believes that neither
the Liberal nor the Conservative par-
ty alone will be able to defeat the
Aberhart government in a general
election. This, he believes, could
only be done by a coalition of the
two old parties.

There are in Alberta many people
of foreign origin who naturally know
little about government, and who be-
lieve that Social Credit will produce
for them an easy living with good
results, he pointed out.

The dollar script which was issued
a couple of years ago has all been
retired except a small portion, which

Lieut. Geist said three heavy Jap-
anese bombers began the attack on
the Panay without warning about
noon on Sunday.
"There is no doubt the Japanese
knew we were Americans," Geist said.
"Three flags were visible plainly.
One was painted on the side of the
ship facing the Japanese motorboat
that machine gunned the sinking Pan-
ay."
McDonald said that while hiding in
the reeds after taking the wounded
ashore we heard motorboats approach
ing and some went down the beach
and saw two army landing boats go-
ing to the Panay."
