## Manuhin, a Youthful Prodigy, On Air Sunday

Perhaps the most spectacular of the General Motors Concerts so far this season will be that to be broadcast on Sunday night, Jan. 24.

On that occasion, the youthful violin prodigy, Yehudi Menuhin, will emerge from a two-year interim seclusion. He will come to New York to appear as soloist with the General Motors Symphony Orchestra, conducted for that concert by his reversed teacher—the internationally-renowned Roumanian conductor-composer-violinist, Georges Enesco.

The nation-wide hook-up of the NEWWEAF, ("Red") Network will broadcast this most interesting musical event between 10 and 11 p.m., EST.

This occasion among the "Sunday Nights at Carnegie Hall" programmes will be one of unusual sentiment, as well as one of the outstanding musical events of the entire year throughout the musical world. The radio will score a "beat" on the concert stage, since it will be Menuhin's only concert since his appearance for General Motors a year ago. That he will appear with Enesco—his mentor—will draw worldwide musical attention to a broadcast. It is possible this concert may be rated as the most unusual and interesting ever to have been broadcast.

For, in addition to Enesco's conducting, he and Menuhin—a renowned teacher and a pupil generally regarded as one of the greatest violinists of the century—will participate together in this concert as joint violin soloists.

They will play the three movements of the famed Bach Concerto for two violins and orchestra in D Minor—"Vivace," "Largo ma non tanto" and "Allegro."

Erno Rapee, permanent conductor, will conduct the orchestra during the playing of the Bach Concerto, and also the final number, Debussy's "Fetes." These two numbers will constitute the second half of the concert.

The musical highlight of the first half of the concert—an exciting event in itself—will be when Enesco conducts his own composition, the noted "Roumanian Rhapsody," No. 7 in A major. This rhapsody has taken its place in musical literature as among the great compositions of our times.

The first half of the concert will open with Enesco conducting the Overture to Mozart's "The Marriage of Figaro." Apropos this number, Enesco's many claims to fame is that, by numerous music critics, he is often rated as the best interpreter of Mozart among conductors.

Following the opening, the teacher will introduce the pupil, and Menuhin will play as Enesco conducts Sarasate's "Gypsy Airs."

In a concert overflowing with interest from many viewpoints, an added item of sentimental interest will attach to the fact that Yehudi will be twenty years old two days before the event.

Last year, one of the great events of the General Motors Concerts' season was when Menuhin made his last appearance as a "boy prodigy" of the violin. Then he retired for two years to the seclusion of his California ranch home to bridge that difficult—for an acknowledged genius—period between boyhood and manhood.

At that time he said that he probably would not play during the two years. But when Enesco arrived in New York as guest conductor, for a time, of the Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra, Yehudi made one exception. Having tentatively agreed to play his first return concert for General Motors, he asked if it would be possible to appear in joint recital with Enesco. Of Enesco, Yehudi said in his telegram, "He is the man and teacher to whom I owe more than to anyone, except my parents—and I wish you would say that in announcing the concert."

Georges Enesco is world-renowned and often referred to as "The Master Musician." He is known as one of the greatest of violinists—perhaps the greatest living teacher of that instrument, as an eminent conductor of symphony orchestras, and as one of the most gifted among living composers. He is also a pianist.

In the United States, during the season 1931-1932, he conducted the Philadelphia Orchestra, and those in Boston, Chicago, Detroit, Cleveland, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Montreal and elsewhere.

A Smith by any Other Name

## NURSERY RHYME SONGS PRESENTED BY KOSTELANETZ

Andre Kostelanetz will present the fourth in a series of special orchestral arrangements of old-time nursery rhymes on his Wednesday broadcast, Jan. 20, at 9 p.m., EST, over the WABC-CBS network.

Kostelanetz will direct his 45 musicians in a sprightly melody built around the favorite song of children for many generations past—"All Around the Mulberry Bush."

Also included in the programme will be "The World Is Mine," "Goodnight My Love," and other songs by Nino Martini, accompanied by the orchestra. The chorus and orchestra will unite in a group of Spanish songs—"Rosita," "La Paloma" and "Toreador Song."

## Guests on Showboat

Lanny Ross will have Gloria Swanson, glamorous screen star, and Monroe Silvers, comedy monologist, as his guests on the Showboat programme, Thursday, Jan. 21, at 9 p.m., EST, over the WEAF-NBC network.

The tenor star will present Miss Swanson in a dramatic sequence and a musical number. Silvers will do his famous comedy act, "Cohen on the Telephone."

As solos, Ross will sing "Please Keep Me in Your Dreams," "May I Have the Next Romance?" a song which he himself introduced on the air, and "For Sentimental Reasons."

## Paradox Department

Nadine Conner, the youthful assisting artist with Nelson Eddy on the Vicks Open House series, might be termed the true internationalist. She speaks and sings seven languages. At one time, she was soloist with a group of Russian choristers, presenting Russian and Ukrainian songs. The accompanist for her first teacher, Alvaro Fernandez, a Spaniard, was Buissere, a Frenchwoman, who formerly played for the European concert, of Madame Schumann-Heink, the late German opera star. Horatio Cogswell, under whom Nadine studied at the University of Southern California, is a Latin-German. On top of that, Miss Conner herself is a Scotch-Irish.

And yet, oddly enough, despite all this international background, Nadine has never been out of the United States. In fact, until she embarked upon her present concert tour with Nelson Eddy, she had never left her native state of California!

Andre Kostelanetz was signed by Republic Pictures to appear in one of their forthcoming musical films. When George Washington Hill, head of the American Tobacco Company heard of the movie, he prevailed upon the film officials to entitle it "The Hit Parade"—as a publicity link with his company's radio programme, "The Lucky Strike Hit Parade."

Kostelanetz is retiring gracefully from that movie contract, and Mr. Hill will now learn that he has been saved from considerable embarrassment thereby. For the Andre Kostelanetz broadcasts are sponsored by—Chesterfield.

## BLIND REJOICE AT PENSION NEWS

OTTAWA, Jan. 19—"That is great news," exclaimed Captain E. A. Baker, M.C., blind Toronto war veteran, when informed by The Globe and Mail that the Government proposes to provide for pensions to the blind at a lower age than seventy years.

Captain Baker, who is head of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, estimated that the cost to the Government will be from \$500,000 to \$550,000 per annum, when all the persons eligible to receive pensions are on the list of recipients.

There are about 3,000 blind persons in Canada between the ages of 40 and 70, he said.

It is anticipated that the pension will be similar to the Old Age Pension, which is \$20 per month.

Some of the blind in Canada are at present receiving unemployment relief payments.

## NEW OUTBREAK OF PARALYSIS IN MANITOBA

WINNIPEG, Jan. 19—A new outbreak of infantile paralysis at scattered Manitoba points worried Provincial health authorities tonight. Several new cases were reported. Hundreds were stricken in an epidemic last summer.

## Eddie Cantor to Dedicate Program to President's Ball

Eddie Cantor will dedicate his entire programme of Sunday, Jan. 24, to the President's Birthday Ball. A two minute period will be turned over to prominent local chairmen of the event in 89 cities so that they may make their appeal for support of the Ball.

The appeals will be made during the regular programme period—8:30 p.m., over the WABC-CBS network. The proceeds will be devoted to the support of the Warm Spring Foundation and the fight against infantile paralysis in America.

Cantor's dedicatory programme comes a week before President Roosevelt's 55th birthday on Saturday, Jan. 30. On that date, in addition to the New York party, celebrations will be held throughout the country.

This will be the third year that America has celebrated the Chief Executive's birthday by arranging social events and donating the funds to his favorite charity.

The Texaco Town programme, of course, will also feature the comedy and songs of the star, Deanna Durbin, Parkyakarkus, Bobby Breen and Jacques Renard's orchestra.
