SOCIAL SERVICE
ARE OUTLINED

Annual Meeting Social Service Council Last Evening

Reports Received
Rev. George Telford is Elected President Ensuing Year

A capacity attendance was present last evening at the annual meeting of the Social Service Council of Fredericton held in the City Council Chamber.

The chairman of the meeting was Rev. George Telford and the meeting was opened with a prayer by Very Rev. Dean Moorhead. Rev. Mr. Telford gave a brief introductory address on the purpose of the Social Service Council. Rev. Mr. Telford explained that the purpose of the Council was to provide a means of reviewing all social work of the city. Rev. Mr. Telford stated that the Social Service Council was a federation rather than a society; its chief purpose being to give a comprehensive view of all family and personal welfare works done by the large number of organizations in our community. It aimed to prevent overlapping in this work and by means of its central welfare board overlapping had been reduced to a minimum. Besides this, the council was ready to take into consideration any social matters which did not come within the scope of any of the various organizations.

The minutes of the last meeting were presented and the treasurer's report was given.

An interesting discussion followed on the problem of dealing with the transient in need of relief and a committee was appointed to study the matter more thoroughly. The question of subnormal members of the community was also discussed.

The reports of organizations, showing the immense amount of charitable work being done in our community was given.

The report of the nominating committee was presented by Mrs. D. J. Shea.

F'ton City Council to Seek Further Legislation

Change in Setup

City Solicitor Meets With Committees Last Night

At a combined meeting of the Legislation committee and the administration of justice committee of the city council last evening at the city hall, presided over by Ald. W. Raymond Crewdson, decision was made that in seeking legislation to have the Police Commission abolished that there should be incorporated as well a substitute setup.

The committees after discussing the matter last night decided to recommend to a special meeting of the city council on Friday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock that the present Police Commission be supplanted by the Administration of Justice Committee, which will be responsible to the city council.

This decision of the committee is in line with the suggestion made by The Daily Mail in more than one occasion. This paper pointed out that the Administration of Justice committee is composed of aldermen responsible to the people. For many years the administration of justice committee had control of the police department of this city. Along in the early nineties a change was made and the Police Commission form of control was introduced. This commission, as has been previously stated, was appointed by the government and was an arbitrary body which was in no way responsible for its actions to the council which is elected by the people. It is rightly felt that the administration of justice committee of the council, which is supposed to be composed of intelligent men, should be able to handle a little police force of seven.

P. J. Hughes, K.C., city solicitor, who sat in with the committees last night was asked to include this latter substitute setup in the legislation which is already being sought to abolish the commission.

The Administration of Justice committee would take over the present duties of the Police Commission, and would be directly responsible to the city council body.

At last night's meeting decision was made also to recommend that the license fee to out-of-town business houses be raised from \$100 to \$400.

DEAL NOT COMPLETED
It is rumored today that the Irving Oil Company are negotiating for the purchase of the Crowley building on Carleton street for the purpose of erecting a large central depot for their bus service. Inquiries today both from Mr. Crowley's place of business and from representatives of the Irving Oil Company in this city bring the reply that no such deal has yet gone through.

SPOKE AT CLUB

E. B. McLatchey is Named Counsel to Department

Put Legal Business

Of Gov't Departments in Control of Legal Department

E. B. McLatchey, barrister of Campbellton, has been appointed as counsel in the Department of the Attorney-General.

In announcing the appointment of Mr. E. B. McLatchey as Counsel in his Department, the Attorney-General stated:

"The practice in the past has been to have much of the legal business of the different Government Departments carried on by lawyers in private practice. It is the intention that henceforth more of this work shall come under the direct control of the Legal Department, a course which it is felt will not only tend to greater efficiency but also prove more economical.

"Another matter which has been considered is the revision of our statute law. In 1903 a general revision was completed. No further systematic revision was made until the preparation and promulgation of the Revised Statutes of 1927. In the period between revisions Acts are often amended many times and it is frequently found necessary in order to find the legislation on a certain subject to examine the Statute law extending over a long period of years. It is the intention to have a more frequent revision of the more commonly used statutes, with complete consolidations and revisions as heretofore but with this work done by the Attorney-General's Department. The last general revision cost the Province, for legal work alone, nearly \$50,000 and it is believed that by the methods now proposed, a very substantial saving can be effected.

"Again there is the matter of Insurance. Some years ago the Privy Council decided that Insurance is a matter within the jurisdiction of the Provinces. Practically all the Provinces of the Dominion have set up Insurance Departments for the regulation of Insurance within their borders. Although the question has been discussed in this Province from time to time, no effective action has yet been taken. In this connection it is only fair to point out that the regular Insurance Companies and groups welcome the establishment of an Insurance Department and the enactment of the necessary legislation. It is the intention of the Government to set up in the Department of the Attorney-General at once, the necessary machinery to superintend this important business.

"Mr. McLatchey is a young Barrister of outstanding ability. It was a case of the job seeking the man and I feel that the Province is fortunate in obtaining his services."

Word has been received here of the death in Los Angeles, Calif., on January 5, after a short illness, of George E. Fenety, formerly of this city. Deceased leaves to mourn his wife and two sisters, Miss Beatrice Fenety of New York, and Mrs. F. W. Daniel of Saint John, also one half brother, W. R. Jonett of Philadelphia. Interment was made at Santa Barbara. The late Mr. Fenety resided in this city until about twenty years ago, when he moved to the west. Relatives residing in this city are Walter P. Fenety, an uncle; Miss Georgina C. Fenety and Mrs. E. S. Carter, aunts; and W. W. O. Fenety, John G. Fenety and Mrs. F. P. Colter are cousins.
