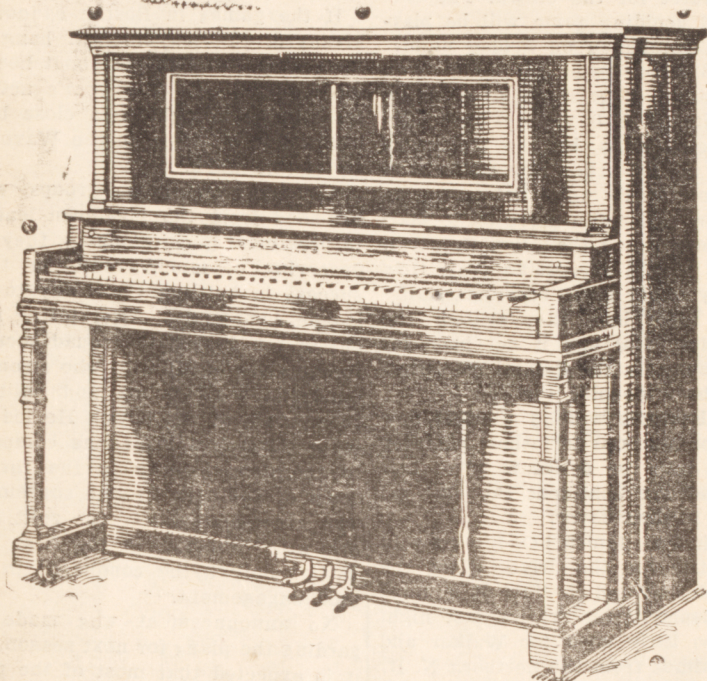

R. P. GORHAM ADDRESSES MEN'S CATHEDRAL CLUB

History of N. B. From Earliest Time to Present

The regular weekly meeting of the Cathedral Men's Club was held last evening in the Memorial hall, Church street, with a good attendance.

After the regular opening with prayers in unison, led by Very Rev. Dean W. H. Moorhead, a short song period was enjoyed. Five members then gave short addresses on things that had interested them—hobbies, current events in local history, embarrassing moments, and experiences were taken up in turn. These short five minute talks are proving to be a feature of the Lenten meetings.

The speaker of the evening was the president, R. P. Gorham, who

spoke on the history of New Brunswick from its earliest known inhabitation by the Paint Indians, down through the ages to the present time. With his wide and intimate knowledge of his subject, a great deal of which comes from his own research, coupled with his interesting narrative form of speaking, Mr. Gorham's address was greatly enjoyed by his audience.

Few, if any, of the members know of the great variety of ownership, forms and types of government; nor the various names and geographical boundaries of our province during its known history. The gradual division into counties, from the time New Brunswick was Cumberland County of Nova Scotia, then all Sunbury County, down to its present subdivision, with the reasons governing the location of the county lines and the names given proved of greatest interest as shown by the speaker on the illustrating maps prepared. The sincere thanks of the meeting were tendered Mr. Gorham by the vice-president.

A number of moving pictures of scenic interest filled out a very enjoyable programme. The usual light refreshments, followed by the National Anthem, ended still another interesting and educational evening by the Cathedral Men's Club.

The Fredericton Presbytery of the United Church of Canada convened in quarterly session in Wilmot Church yesterday morning at ten o'clock.

Rev. H. H. Blanchard, chairman, presided and conducted the devotional exercises. The following were present: Ministers, Revs. H. H. Blanchard, H. M. Upham, George Telford, J. W. Bartlett, Harry Burns, W. A. Burge, W. J. Domville, D. E. Hattie, H. J. Rowley, M. D. Oliver, Gordon C. Pringle, J. E. Shanklin, J. H. Sulston, E. E. Fytche, Ralph W. Barker, R. H. Barker, Dr. F. A. Wightman, J. S. Gregg and D. R. Chown; laymen: W. M. Burns, Moses Mitchell, Rowley Manzer, W. C. Reed, A. T. Burpee, Lester McNamara and W. E. McMullen.

Rev. Wm. Godfrey, superintendent of missions being present was cordially welcomed on this his first official visit. Mr. Godfrey addressed the meeting.

On motion the sympathy of the Presbytery was extended to Rev. J. H. Sulston in the loss of his wife.

Rev. George Telford reported for the Home Mission Committee, recommending grants to the aid-receiving charges. Rev. J. H. Sulston, pastor of the Oromocto charge, spoke hopefully of the work in the new settlement on the Broad Road. The Pension Fund Committee report was given by Rev. W. J. Domville. Rev. E. E. Fytche reported for the Missionary and Maintenance Fund, showing a small decrease in comparison with last year.

Rev. J. E. Shanklin submitted the report of the committee on Evangelism and Social Service.

The Presbytery decided to adopt the four year plan as set forth in the leaflets issued by the Temperance Council and the use of Study Groups to accomplish this end in the local congregations. The Presbytery also endorsed the work of the Christian Temperance League and would urge our people to take a deeper interest in the work of the abolition of the liquor traffic. The Presbytery placed itself on record in reaffirming our dissatisfaction with the present liquor law and with the way this law is enforced. The Presbytery deplored the drinking of intoxicating liquors among church members and would urge the church to take a more decided stand in promoting total abstinence.
