here last night, when he addressed the annual dinner of the Dominion Association of Fire Chiefs.
"Results in the future," he concluded, "depend upon careful study today and that study includes the necessary co-operation of all forces in any war affected by fire losses."
Chief Alex. Hope of Port Arthur, dealt with a resolution passed at the Provincial Firefighters' Federation in Kingston, to the effect that legislation be sought forcing the municipalities to pay a reasonable share of the maintenance of a pension fund, and reported he had learned that only five centres in Ontario had pension schemes, although the question had been brought up at every convention since 1911.

LONDON, Aug. 27.—The members of the sub-committee of the non-intervention committee met today after a three weeks recess. Many nations have already paid in their contributions, at an early date the committee will be free of debt. Lord Plymouth said that the reports of the committee would be ready in September.

MELBOURNE, Aug. 27.—The Australian will spend eleven and a half million pounds for defence purposes during the coming year. Of this amount two million pounds will be spent in England for equipment which cannot be procured in Australia. The country is now said to be enjoying a higher degree of prosperity than it has enjoyed since before the depression.

yet, Grasshoppers are plentiful on the prairies and many eggs are being laid for next year.

Fruit crops are promising in all the producing Provinces.

The dry conditions in the Maritime Provinces have been partially relieved by scattered showers recently. More rain would benefit late crops and pastures. Early sown grains are promising, but late crops are only fair to poor. Late planted potatoes are below average, but early field crops are good. Apples will yield a large crop of good quality.

Rains have held up the harvest in Quebec and much of the grain crop is lodged. Yield of oats will be below last year. Pastures are good and the potato crop indicates a large output. Heavy rainfall in Ontario has delayed harvest and caused some losses from grain sprouting in the field. Yields are below the promise of some weeks ago. Pastures, roots and corn are all good and fruit crops are yielding well.

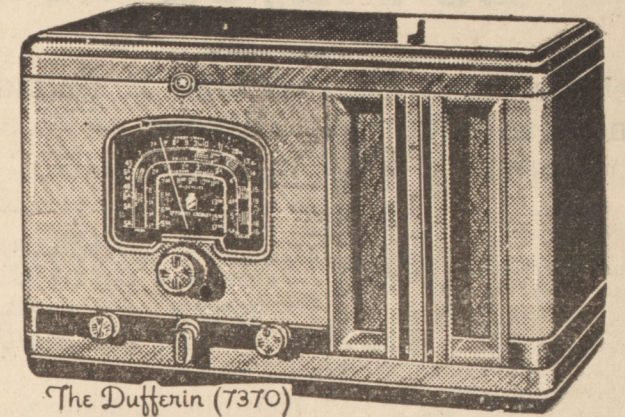

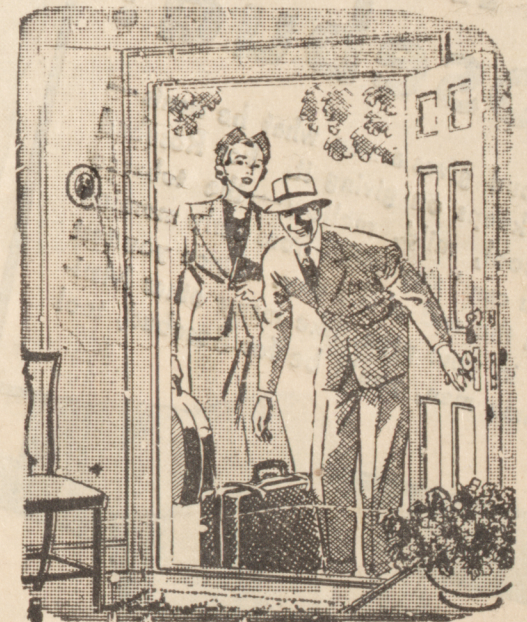

SHOULD BUY HOME GROWN AND HOME CANNED GOODS

President of Fruit Growers' Association Shows How Money Unreturned Leaves Country

FREDERICTON WOMAN PRESIDENT

The Convention of Loyalist District Women's Institute Well Attended

In a forceful address before the Loyalist convention of the counties of York and Sunbury which met yesterday afternoon and last evening at Nashwaak Bridge, W. W. Hubbard, president of the New Brunswick Fruit Growers Association stressed the importance of buying home products.

Mr. Hubbard showed how much money was leaving the country every day and going to other lands for fruit, vegetables and other products that could be grown at home.

Fruit including New Brunswick apples, canned vegetables were some of the articles that should be bought at home and new Brunswickers should ask for New Brunswick products when buying their foodstuffs.

Dr. W. W. Warwick's chief medical officer for New Brunswick, gave a talk on cancer which was listened to with much interest. Mr. Frank Shortt gave a paper on the duties of canners. Mrs. William Sansom, Durham Bridge, spoke on poultry, and Mrs. Frank Bolton, Currieburg, on "Adult Education." Mr. Hubbard discussed agricultural topics.

As a result of the judging of flowers and other exhibits, prizes were awarded the following institutes: Pillow slips, Lincoln; aprons, Millville; gladioli, first Sheffield; second, Barker's Point; third, Burton; asters, first, Burton; second, Sheffield; third, Devon, and snapdragons first, Sheffield; second, Barker's Point and third, Burton.

Lincoln and Stanley institutes provided entertainment for the visitors after supper. Miss Lois Stephenson, Manguerville, president of the district, occupied the chair.
