### AEROPLANE FLIES OVER

### TO ATTEND MEETING

### Aged and Respected Lady Passes Away At North Devon

Miss Mary Ann MacLean, a lady who was well and favorable known along the valley of the Nashwaak, and at Devon, passed away this morning at the home of her sister, Mrs. John R. Young, North Devon. The death occurred after a short illness. She had reached the advanced age of eighty-eight years.

The late Miss MacLean, who was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John MacLean of Taymouth resided at that place practically all her life. She came to Devon two years ago to make her home with her sister, Mrs. R. Young, mother of E. M. Young, well-known hardware merchant of this city. Miss MacLean is survived by her two sisters, Mrs. John R. Young of North Devon and Mrs. J. E. McNabb of Kingsclear. She is also survived by two brothers, Frederick and George MacLean of Durham Bridge. Frank, Robert and Lloyd VanWart of this city, and Clive VanWart are nephews and she has several other nephews who are connected with the MacLean and McNabb, Vanhorn and Walls families of Durham Bridge. The funeral will take place at 2.30 o'clock on Saturday afternoon from the home of Mrs. John R. Young. Rev. Dr. J. W. Bartlett of Wilnot Church will conduct the service and interment will be made in the family plot at Durham Bridge.

### Aged Resident Of Taymouth Passes

Death occurred this morning of Miss Margaret J. Brown at the home of her nephew, James Urquhart, at Taymouth. The deceased had been in failing health for some time and passed away in her eighty-ninth year. She was well known and highly respected member of the community and her passing will be mourned by a great circle of friends. She is survived by one brother, John A. Urquhart of British Columbia and three nephews, James, Burton and William of Taymouth. Also surviving are two nieces, Mrs. Harold Burr of St. Stephen and Mrs. Edith Hoyt of North Devon. Funeral arrangements will be made later.

### Charged Supplying Liquor To Indian

William Laird was remanded until 2.30 o'clock this afternoon when he appeared before Police Magistrate Limerick this morning charged with supplying liquor to Indians.

Information was laid by City Police who testified that on August 26 they saw Laird come out of the liquor store with a bottle of wine in his hand. They further stated that they followed Laird behind the Court House and up Campbell Street to the rear of the Boat House. There they found Laird accompanied by Peter Brooks, an Indian sitting on the river bank and upon searching the two they found the quart of wine on the ground behind the Indian and also two quarts of beer lying near by. The case was resumed this afternoon.

Peter Brooks, the Indian in the case, was found guilty of having liquor in an unauthorized place. He was fined one hundred dollars or in default of payment was sentenced to serve one month in jail.

## RETAIL LUMBER MERCHANTS ASSN. MEETS TOMORROW

Proposes More Wood Finishes in Homes—Lower Rates by H.I.P. and Compensation Bd.

### Proposals To Govt.

Business Session at the Queen Followed By An Outing At Experimental Station.

Between thirty-five and fifty members of the Retail Lumber Merchants Association are expected to arrive in the city this evening and tomorrow morning to attend the annual meeting of the association which takes place here tomorrow.

Several matters will be promoted by the convention, all of which are for the advancement of the lumber trade in the province and elsewhere. A drive will be made by the association, it is understood, to promote wood interior finishing in housing operations rather than imported materials, while another salient point of the convention will be a discussion of the rates charged the lumber manufacturers and woodworking plants by the Workman's Compensation Board.

It is claimed by the association that the rates are extortionate in proportion to the number of accidents which occur in well regulated mills and factories, and which in a great proportion protect their men from injury with foolproof safety devices and precautions.

It is also believed by the association that the rates of interest charged under the Dominion Housing Act and the Home Improvement Plan, and the amount of red tape which the home owners must become entangled in, make the scheme less practical than it otherwise should be. They believe that less housebuilders make use of the scheme for this reason, and that the lumber business suffers a setback.

It is understood that the association will submit proposals to the Government regarding these matters, and that an attempt will be made to have the rates in both cases reduced to a less topheavy scale.

The business session of the association will be held at the Queen Hotel and will be followed by a social program. Local arrangements are being made by a committee composed of Alderman David McCaughey of the J. C. Risteen Co. Ltd., Alderman Roy Fowler and N. R. Perley of the Devon Lumber Co. and representatives of Fraser Companies Ltd.

The outing which is planned by the local committee will take place at the Dominion Experimental Station tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock. Alderman McCaughey stated this morning. The members will inspect the farm and buildings and attend a picnic being held there for them. It is expected that guest speakers will be present, but definite plans have not been made due to the uncertain weather conditions.

Emery D. Smith of Saint John, president of the association will occupy the chair during the business session.

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## ABERDEEN STREET AND BEAVERBROOK STREET TO BE EXTENDED TO UNIV. AVE.

Preliminary Work Will Commence Within the Next Couple of Weeks

### TEMPORARY ROAD THROUGH SUBWAY

The New Street Extensions Will Be of Great Convenience To Citizens

Citizens generally will be pleased to learn that the Roads and Streets Committee of the City Council has decided to start this fall with the preliminary work leading to the extension of Aberdeen Street East through to University Avenue and the extension of Beaverbrook Street through the lower part of the University grounds until it strikes University Avenue a short distance below the College gate. This announcement, which was made to The Daily Mail this morning by Alderman David McCaughey, chairman of the Roads and Streets Committee of the City Council, will be received with satisfaction by the citizens generally as this extension of the streets named will be of great convenience to citizens in all parts of the city.

It is not probable that the work will be completed this season but the preliminary work will be started as soon as possible.

The chairman of the Roads and Streets Committee also made a statement to the effect that 80% of the street paving program has been completed, and that a meeting of the committee will be held on Monday or Tuesday to further discuss matters in connection with the sidewalk construction program. The idea is to complete the roads and streets construction program now under way before proceeding with work on the proposed street extensions.

Speaking to The Daily Mail today, Alderman McCaughey stated that the temporary roadway through the subway area is now being fixed up and that when this is completed the present detour by way of Church and George or Charlotte streets will be abandoned. This temporary roadway will probably be completed today, as it should only require a few hours to make the street at this point suitable for temporary traffic. This matter was referred to by The Daily Mail this week.

### No Japanese Beetles In This District, Says R. E. Balch

"No live Japanese Beetles have ever been found in the Fredericton district," it was stated here last night by R. E. Balch, entomologist in charge of the Dominion Entomological Laboratory on the campus of the University of New Brunswick. A report from Ottawa, which stated that special precaution is being taken all along the American-Canadian border to prevent the influx of the destructive beetles into this country, was denied by Mr. Balch as far as this section is concerned.

The local entomologists have been watching for the beetle for the past two or three years, but no live ones have ever been found, although a few dead ones have been found on American automobiles coming across the border. The beetles are often struck by the front of cars travelling along American roads, the dead ones found in this section being taken off the radiators of tourist cars.

Arthur Finnimore, district inspector of the plant inspection office, department of agriculture, Saint John, is at present running a few traps in King Square of that city, but no live beetles have been caught, and the traps will be removed about Sept. 1. The traps are baited with geraniol, a substance which is very attractive to the pest. If they are in the country at all there is every chance that specimens will be caught in such traps.

No traps have ever been set in this district for the beetles, but some have been established at a few points on the border, especially around St. Stephen, where cars are likely to bring the insects into the country.

The beetles, which have spread extensively over different areas in the United States, have caused great damage to fruit and other trees. Although none of the insects have been found alive in Canada, according to a report from Ottawa, every means possible is being taken to insure their absence from the Dominion.

## MRS. WM. WALKER'S WILL PROBATED HERE THIS WEEK

The Estate Is Valued In Probate Court At \$37,500

### Husband, Bros., Share

Four Thousand Dollar Bequest St. Andrew's Church This City

The will of the late Mrs. Annie MacKay Walker, wife of William Walker, Lansdowne Street, was admitted to probate within the last few days. The estate is valued as being of the value of between \$37 and \$38,000 dollars. After making a bequest of four thousand dollars to St. Andrew's Church in this city the residue of the estate is divided equally between William Walker, husband of the deceased and three brothers, Ernest MacKay, W. D. MacKay and Walter MacKay all of this city. The summer home situated in the parish of Kingsclear is left to William Walker, husband of the late Mrs. Walker and he also is left the privilege of selecting what jewelry, furniture and other personal effects at the family home that he may desire. An amount necessary to provide for perpetual care of the family lot at the Rural Cemetery has been left to the trustees of that organization.

Provision is made in the will that in the event of the death of any of the brothers mentioned in the will that share coming to that brother is to be divided amongst the nephews of the deceased. As W. D. MacKay one of the brothers passed away since the will was made and during the serious illness of Mrs. Walker his share will according to the will go to the nephews of the testator.

No mention is made in the will of the concrete residence lately purchased by the Mr. and Mrs. Walker on Lansdowne Street. This residence was purchased only a short time before the death of Mrs. Walker. If it was the property of Mrs. Walker and not especially mentioned in the will it would be included in the residue of the estate and would be divided equally.
