POWER OF BRITISH WOMEN SEEN BY BEVERLEY BAXTER AS BULWARK OF NATION

Mrs. Stanley Baldwin and Mrs. N. Chamberlain
Hold Fort, Says Noted Writer

TORONTO, Sept. 16—Speaking before a capacity audience of more than 1,200 women, and a number of men, at the opening of the season meeting of the Women's Canadian Club recently, in the Eaton Auditorium, College Street, A. Beverley Baxter, M.P., noted journalist and native Torontonian, paid tribute to the women behind the scenes of the British politics, who have been the inspiration and support of their husbands in high places. He also bespoke for Great Britain the unswerving trust of the people of Canada.
"During the present crisis there are two or three women who have played a powerful part in shaping the life of the country," he said.
One of these is Mrs. Stanley Baldwin, but for whose influence there might have been no Baldwin regime. Of Mrs. Neville Chamberlain, he said she is "one of the sweetest little women in the world," without whose inspiration and support the Prime Minister might not have undertaken the heavy burden of Empire he is carrying, at 68 years of age.
"In the adulation which went out to Mr. Baldwin—and make no mistake about it, Mr. Baldwin is the greatest living Englishman—" (Applause) "his wife who bears the name of Lucy, has been somewhat lost track of. But when after ten years of Parliamentary life he wanted to quit, it was Mrs. Baldwin who said: 'Will you give it one more year?' To that extent she has played a great part in English history. She believed in his star when he did not himself believe."
"At present when Neville Chamberlain is carrying on his shoulders the great burdens of Empire he has by day and night the comfort and support of one of the sweetest little women in the world," he continued. "Their love is one of the romances of English life."
"Great Britain is going through a difficult time at this hour," he said, after reviewing some of the problems confronting the government. "The British people do not think that they know everything. Nor does the government think it will not, and does not make any mistakes," he added, explaining that decisions in great issues often evoke grave doubt on the part of the Cabinet. "But when I go back I am going to tell them that Canada trusts them." (Applause).

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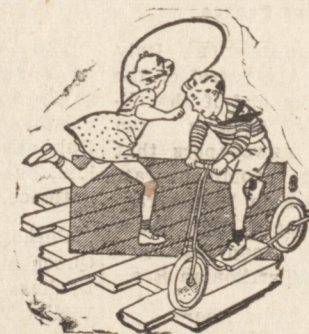
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
