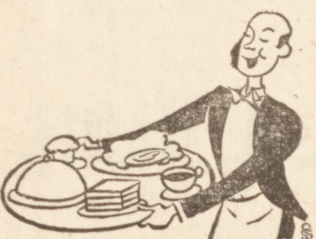

through to completion rather than spreading it out over a period of ten years. The roads, he said, would pay for themselves over and over again in the increased tourist traffic, due to the abolition of the dust nuisance.

The roads has been highly successful in resisting frost cracking, the Premier claimed. The first year, a harder road was laid, and despite the fact that it withstood the severe winter very well, a more elastic pavement has been laid after consulting the finest road engineers on the continent, with the result that the cracking amounts to less than one per cent.

### Beauty of N. B.

At the recent meeting of the Canadian Good Roads Association, the new roads received the highest of praise. It was stated that they are standing up better than roads in any other province. The Premier also spoke of his meetings with tourists from other parts of the continent, and the impression the beauty of the province made on them. They were delighted with the unspoiled beauty, and especially with that of the Saint John River Valley.

Major Bruce, replying to the toast to Fredericton, said that although he has resided here for only eleven months, it would not be difficult to answer to a toast to such a fine city. He said that he had lived in every province in the Dominion other than Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, and that one sees beauty and meets fine people wherever one is, but that he had never seen beauty to surpass that of the province and the city of Fredericton, nor had he met finer people. In closing he congratulated the Association for their fine organization and their service to the province.

### Big Hunting Year

G. H. Prince, Deputy Minister of Lands and Mines, in speaking briefly on the game and hunting situation, said that during 1936 more than 2,158 non-resident fishing licenses of all kinds were issued, 300 more than in any preceding year since non-resident fishing licenses first were established in 1910, and more than 54 more than in 1935.

In regard to non-resident hunters, the number in 1936 was 1,030, involving employment for 920 guides, and there is every indication that the number this year will exceed 1936. Already 840 guides have been licensed, he said.

Pirie, minister of lands and mines, was to be present, but was called home this morning on account of the illness of his mother.

## FISH & GAME

### Game Protective Service

One of the other important resolutions was that the government be urged to establish a non-political game, is that the wardens might be appointed for their knowledge of conditions and good service rather than through politics.

The Association also asked that wardens on the Jacquet River be kept in service until the river freezes, that two wardens be appointed for service in Grand Manan for 10 months of the year, and that all provincial wardens be engaged for the same time period.

It was asked that more deer be placed on Grand Manan and that all game shot in the island be reported to the wardens within 24 hours. A shorter partridge season was asked for the island, and that it open on Oct. 15 and close on Oct. 30.

### No Bounty On Bears

The question of the bounty on bears was again introduced but met with the disapproval of the convention.

The convention approved of the wood season opening on Sept. 15 instead of Oct. 1, but they did not ask that the closing date be earlier because the birds have left by that time.

It was felt that the closed season on geese and brant at present should be extended to 1938, as the eel grass was said not to have shown sufficient growth and not to have returned to its former quality and quantity. The Quebec government will be asked to co-operate in the protection of these two game birds, especially on the Maine and Quebec boundary, where violations have been alleged.

### Should Tag Dogs

Recommendations will be made that the municipalities of the province be required to tag dogs; that the required license be supplied by the provincial government and that the game department be supported strongly in its efforts to curtail the activities of police and Alsatian shepherd dogs.

The provincial government also will be urged to see that the act and bag limit for trout be enforced strictly and that the regulations be better advertised to the people of the province. Considerable discussion was heard on the size of trout, but a resolution in this regard was lost. It was pointed out also that provincial regulations prohibit Sunday fishing in Restigouche County, and it was asked that these be rescinded, as it was felt they were unfair to the people of that county when they did not apply to others in the province.

### To Dynamite Fish Falls

The federal government will be requested to supply the Saint John branch with dynamite so that dynamiting of fish falls in the Lepreau supplied by the branch in order that salmon can get up the river. The association was desirous also of having more game refuges in the province.

made Dec. 31, 1937, instead of March 31, 1938. This qualification was added because it was felt that the present Council could not constitutionally bind the incoming Council. At that time, however, it was not understood that because of an agreement between the Provincial and Dominion governments such a change of date was not possible. Therefore, in order not to lose the grant altogether, it was decided to take a change on binding next year's Council.

Although the motion to issue the bonds was passed at the meeting of the Council early in the month, the formality of authorizing the City Treasurer to call for tenders was not attended to until yesterday. The bonds are to be of \$500 denomination to bear interest of 3½ per cent and are for 10 year duration.

### \$5,800 Spent on Labor

During the past two months the City has spent \$5,800 on labor in connection with the sidewalk and road paving program, it was pointed out. When the program has been finished, the City will have spent \$10,000 on payrolls alone, of which the provincial government is pledged to pay 75 per cent.

By accepting this grant of \$7,500 from the government, the citizens of this city will be saved from paying that amount in taxes, since the money would have to be spent anyway, it was stated. The fact was emphasized that this money will not be spent for relief, since relief has definitely been abolished in this city.

The meeting, which was of very short duration, was called on the instance of Deputy Mayor Ray T. Forbes, who presided.

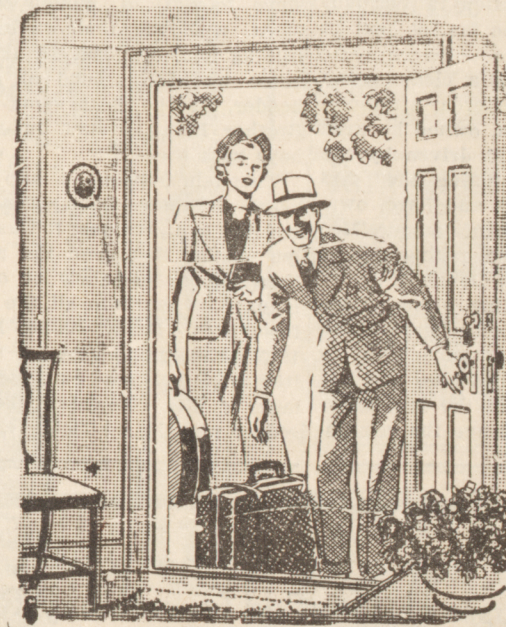
