by hand should be careful to have
the coal pile properly ventilated.
This ventilation is done by having
pipes or even long wooden tubes
with holes cut through at close
intervals, set in different places in
the coal pile.

This will stop heating of the coal
or spontaneous combustion.

We have had several cases of this
in the city and the Fire Dept. will be
pleased to give any information
along this line that we can.

The Cathedral Men's Club

At the regular weekly meeting of
the Cathedral Men's Club last night
two visitors from Saint John church-
es were welcomed, Mr. Pritchard,
a one time member of the Cathedral
choir and now of the Mission Church
of St. John the Baptist, met many
former acquaintances, and Mr. Beck
of Trinity congregation made new
acquaintances among the members.
The club music committee had a
surprise feature for the members in
the attendance of Ryan's Orchestra
which rendered several numbers in
connection with the opening exer-
cises and songs.

Karl Walker, chief of the Frederic-
ton fire department, gave the edu-
cational address of the evening on
the subject of "Fire Prevention." Fire
Prevention Week, he stated had
its origin in 1871 and is now a regu-
lar October feature in most Cana-
dian cities and is believed to be very
useful in helping to overcome care-
lessness about homes and business
premises, a too common cause of fire
loss. Carelessness is not only a
cause of fire loss of property but of
lives as well and the record of one
half the lives so lost in Canada last
year being those of children stands
as a grim commentary on the care-
lessness of older people.

Continuing the speaker told of the
work, equipment and needs of the
Fredericton fire department and paid
tribute to the public spirit of the
men who gave of their strength and
ability and daily risked their lives in
the service of the public. Features of
fire fighting, the dangers of cellar
fires, fires caused by spontaneous
combustion of common materials,
the dangers of waste material in
yards and buildings were described
and the use of the smoke and gas
mask demonstrated. Concluding,
the speaker invited the members of the
Club to become better acquainted
with the work the fire department
was doing in the protection of their
personal property as individuals and
of the city in which they live. By
such knowledge they as citizens of
Fredericton could better aid in pre-
venting fires, the common danger of
all.

In moving an address of thanks
to the speaker, Robert Hazlett spoke
of some of the abuses of electrical
equipment entailing risk of fire
which he had seen in connection
with his work. George Howie in se-
conding the motion spoke of the con-
gested traffic conditions near the
fire station which sometimes inter-
fered with getting the equipment out
in response to calls and of near ac-
cidents which he had observed due
to the carelessness of motor drivers
in not giving the firemen a fair
chance to do their work. He paid
tribute to the excellent work of the
Fredericton firemen.

Games, and the usual crackers
and cheese, often laughed at but al-
ways gladly eaten were other fea-
tures of the evening and the meet-
ing closed with the National Anth-
em.
