## U.N.B. DEBATERS WIN A DECISION OVER ACADIA

A University of New Brunswick debating team comprising leader Jack E. Morpurgo, East. Barnett, Herts, Eng., and William A. Gibbon, Edinburgh, Scotland, won a decision last night over an Acadia University team of leader Carroll O. Fritze, Lunenburg, N. S., and D. H. Delong, Woodstock.

The U.N.B. speakers supported the negative of the subject, "Resolved that Great Britain can more readily secure its own safety and contribute more to world peace by means of alliances than through the League of Nations."

The contest was the first of the schedule of the Maritime Intercollegiate Debating Union for U.N.B. to participate in this year.

The first speaker, Mr. Delong, stressed weaknesses of the League of Nations, emphasizing failure of the league in the Ethiopian and Spanish crises.

Mr. Morpurgo contended the league had not been a complete failure and mentioned work it had done in the Saar question and showing its splendid capabilities for arbitration.

Mr. Fritze expressed an opinion that some system of alliance was necessary, because the powers were arming to such a great extent the league could do nothing to stop it. A system of alliance was therefore the only arrangement that could prevent war, he submitted.

Mr. Gibbon remarked there was an ideal behind the league but none behind the method of alliance. "The very fact that you can arbitrate in the League of Nations is ipso facto a recommendation for the league," he concluded.

The judges were Walter W. V. Foster, M.L.A., Horace Hanson and Frank Park. I. B. Rouse was chairman.

ings and dividend prospects, we are forced to recognize a revival of that get-rich-quick spirit which proved so disastrous in the pre-depression years," said Mr. Dunning.

"As business activity increases and especially if the commodity price level shows a rapid rise this speculative fever is likely to become more widespread and more hectic, creating false standards of value and an unbalanced development with their inevitable aftermath.

"It is not too early, therefore, to call attention to those potential dangers and to express the hope that adequate measures may be taken with sufficient promptness to keep un-sound developments in check.

"The Bank of Canada has the power to control the total volume of credit in circulation, but if the amount of credit flowing into the special channel of speculation is to be regulated there will be needed the effective co-operation of the stock exchanges and the banking institutions which will be called upon increasingly to finance speculative activity.

"We are, I hope, too close to 1929 to forget the necessity of ordered progress and well-balanced development."
