Propose to Mechanize Fire Equipment

A proposal to mechanize the entire 'a worse tyrant than former Premier fire-fighting equipment of the Fredericton Fire Department was informally discussed at a meeting of the fire committee of the city council held this morning. There was no action taken in the matter, but it is understood the proposal is being seriously considered by the committee. Although not officially stated, it is believed that the matter will be again

taken up at a later meeting. The mechanization of the department will result in decreased fire insurance rates in the city. The purchase of added equipment will do away with the horses, thus effecting a saving in the cost of feeds, etc.

VALLEY MOTOR COMPANY LIMITED ALLEGED "JOKER" ESTATES PAID IN SUFFERS HEAVY LOSS BY FIRE WHICH OBJECT OF SEARCH SUCCESSION FEES SWEPT THE PREMISES LAST EVENING

The resident of Jubilee Street at Kinghorn, Chestnut, Four Automobiles Destroyed in Blaze Which False Alarm Calls Gutted Second Story of Westmorland Street Car Establishment

Loss Nearly \$25,000

False Alarms Hamper Work of Fire-Fighting Brigade --- Police Conducting Close Investigation Into Incident

Raked by a disastrous fire which swept through the upper section of the three-story wooden structure and defied the efforts of fire-fighters alrms which were rung in early last for nearly nine hours, the Valley Motor Company, Limited, Westmorland evening. This alleged "prank" great Street, suffered a loss believed to exceed \$20,000. The blaze, which broke out at 7.30 o'clock last evening, destroyed four automobiles and considerable automobile repairing equipment in the second storey of the building.

About thirty cars stored in the fire-ridden portion of the premises were ly before the outbreak of the fire removed to safety, although several of them, including three 1938 Essex which caused considerable damage to Terraplanes were damaged by smoke and water. The upholstering of one of the latter was ruined, while the exterior "finish" of the car was also badly damaged. The blaze was not finally extinguished until after three o'clock

> > Remove Cars

Immediately after the fire was discovered, employees of the company, as well as members of the fire-fighting squad succeeded in removing about 25 cars from the danger zone. The cars destroyed included one late model Essex Terraplane, while two other cars of a similar make but of an earlier model were also burned. The fourth car was a 1928 Essex W. E. Scully Passes in coach which was being repaired. All four cars were owned by the company.

Many of the cars rescued belonged to private individuals who had their cars in winter storage. Several were damaged by smoke and water.

The department accomplished efficient work in controlling the blaze. The fire was a stubborn one and it was several hours before the last spark was extinguished. It is understood that the company will commence repairing operations immedi-

Hamper Work of Firemen Citizens Indignant

Police Unearth Clues Which May Lead to Solution of Case

City police are leaving "no stone unturned" to apprehend the person ly hampered the work of the department, particularly at a time when what may have been a disastrous conflagration, was in progress. Shortthe Valley Motors Company, Limited, premises on Westmorland Street, the department answered a call from the fire box at the corner of Regent and George Streets. Arriving there the fire-fighters found it was a false alarm. At that time a second alarm was rung in from the box at the corner of Westmorland and Victoria Streets. This also proved to be a

In the meantime fire broke out in the Valley Motors Company estabishment, and it was several minutes before the department was able to espond to the call.

Police and fire department officials believed that the "fake" calls were the work of one person. They have evidence which leads them to believe that the man was using an automobile and, after ringing in the first false alarm immediately proceeded to the corner of Victoria and Westmorland Streets where he sounded the second

Have Clues?

Although no official statement was nade this morning, it was intimated that the investigators have unearthed several important clues which might lead to the arrest and conviction of the guilty person.

The seriousness of such an irresponsible action was stressed this morn ing by Fire Chief Karl Walker, who stated that drastic consequences could easily develop as result of the action. Last night's incident was a striking example of how the prant of an alleged "practical joker" might easily seriously hamper the efficient operation of any fire department.

Citizens are indignant regardin the whole matter, and every effort will be made to bring the responsible person to justice. The offence is a serious one and the offender is liable to heavy sentence of imprisonment.

The local rink will be met at Montreal by the Truro team representing the Province of Nova Scotia, and the Charlottetown team, representing P.


The curling squads will be guests at Maple Leaf Gardens, Toronto, on Saturday night, when the Montreal Maroons meet the Toronto Leafts.

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
