Noted Educationist Criticizes Present System as Inadequate --- Urges N.B.W.I. to Lend Support to New Scheme

LECTURE GIVEN BY REV. CANON FULLER

Reverse the curriculum, adopt the "6-3-3" plan of rural education, and we in New Brunswick will have an ideal system, comparable to any nation of the world," said Dr. Fletcher Peacock, director of educational services, speaking before the N.B.W.I. convention here last night. "Health must come first, physical education next, practical subjects next, and abstract subjects last, instead of the reversed order in use at the present time," said Dr. Peacock.

This reversed order will work in conjunction with the so-called "6-3-3" plan, which constitutes 6 years of primary education in general school subjects, then 3 years of intermediate training, in which the students will be "sifted out" and placed in their proper vocational or professional training, as the case warrants. The final three years will be devoted to the training of the pupil in his chosen line.


