visit to the Capital of the Province of New Brunswick.

"We feel, indeed, honored that you have been pleased, as Governor-General of the Dominion of Canada, to visit us at this time; we trust that your stay with us may be so pleasant that it will induce you to return again."

Fredericton, the third oldest of the Provincial capitals, established over a century and a half ago, the anniversary of which we celebrated two years ago, can lay claim with pride to being the birthplace of several of the foremost Canadian poets and authors to this birthday of literary genius we welcome you as one of the leading authors of the Empire with a long list of successful publications.

The chief magistrate then referred to the outstanding achievements in the career of the Governor-General, and asked that His Excellency convey to the reigning monarch of the Empire the assurance of the loyalty and devotion of the citizens of Fredericton.

In conclusion, he said: "I again say how glad we are to welcome your Excellencies and I trust that every minute of your stay among us will be filled with pleasure and happiness and trust you will carry away with you many happy memories of your visit to Fredericton."

### Makes Reply

Replying to His Worship Mayor Kitchen, His Excellency thanked him for the kind welcome he received, and the fine friendly spirit shown to him by the City of Fredericton. He spoke of the wise and fitting choice of selecting Fredericton for the Capital of the Province, it being so centrally located. He referred to the natural beauty of the city, with its stately trees and beautiful scenery. "Fredericton has all the necessities of an ideal Capital," was his tribute to the city.

His Excellency spoke further about the wonderful sporting country surrounding this district, asserting that he looked forward to his fishing trip with greatest expectation. He jocularly remarked that he hoped that the fishing does not entice people away from church. He said that at one time, the church heads of this district reported to England that the fishing was so good, that church attendance was falling off seriously.

### Highly Pleased

His Excellency was highly pleased to see the Yellow and Black colors of Fredericton High School, since they were the same as his own school colors.

The students of the high school rendered "Rule Britannia," and then a bouquet was presented to Her Excellency by little Miss Eva Herbin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Herbin, Saint John, and grand-daughter of His Worship the Mayor and Mrs. Kitchen. Her Excellency was highly pleased with the presentation, kissing the little lady on the cheek. Those on the platform were presented to their Excellencies, and then Lady Tweedsmuir visited the V.O.N. exhibit in the Council Chamber, where she was greeted by Alderman McKnight, president of the Board, and V.O.N. nurses, Misses Pond and MacArthur. Other members of the order and board were also present, Miss Florence Green, who designed the V.O.N. exhibit, was congratulated by her Excellency.

ler's confidante, Ambassador Joachim Von Ribbentrop.

Britain is wooing Berlin more than Rome, but the Italians are not being overlooked either. If a defensive entente between Germany and Italy makes it appear that 1914 is being re-enacted, then Britain hopes that history will repeat itself again to the extent that Italy will abandon Germany and plunk to the other side in any war that is not defensive, but offensive.

"A good Lord Mayor of Birmingham in a lean year" was the way the late Lord Birkenhead described Chamberlain. Lloyd George called Chamberlain "a local man with a local mind." Still another description of Chamberlain was "a congenial quartermaster sergeant."

How long he will hold it is another thing. Chamberlain's age is against him, not to mention Hitler and Mussolini. Baldwin was 69 when he retired, because of his infirmities; Chamberlain is assuming office at 68. He is the oldest man to become Premier in the last 80 years, excepting for Henry Campbell-Bannerman, who took office at 69.

## Succession

a complete reorientation of provincial taxing rights in the field of estate death duties.

Announcement of Premier William Aberhart of Alberta cancelling reciprocal agreements with Ontario, New Brunswick, British Columbia, Great Britain and Northern Ireland, was almost immediately followed by Premier Mitchell Hepburn's announcement that similar reciprocal arrangements between Ontario and British Columbia, Alberta and Nova Scotia were to be cancelled, effective June 1.

This week, Ontario's cabinet cancelled its reciprocal agreements with Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick. Agreements with Great Britain, Northern Ireland, Trinidad and Tobago remain, but Ontario now has no reciprocity agreement with any of the other Canadian provinces. Ontario has never had reciprocal succession duty exemption with Quebec, Saskatchewan or Manitoba.

Duplicate Taxation  
In brief, the action of the two provinces means that if a resident of Ontario died owing assets in Alberta and Nova Scotia no exemption from Ontario succession duty would be allowed for succession duty collected by Alberta and Nova Scotia on the Ontario man's assets located in those provinces. It also means that Nova Scotians and Albertans holding assets in Ontario are taxed twice on the same assets at death.

What is seldom realized by investors and businessmen holding securities is that these may represent assets in two, three or more provinces.

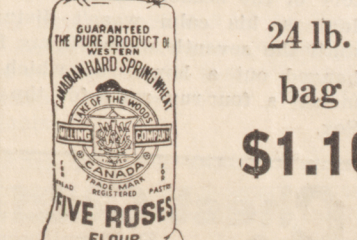

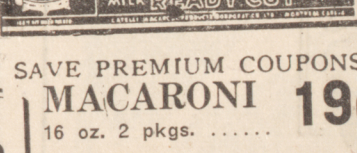

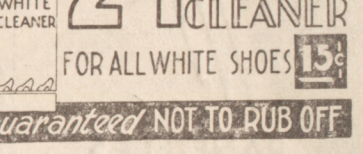
