

# Bathurst Papermakers Advance to New Brunswick Junior Finals

## Papermakers Lose 4-3 In Overtime, But Win 8-7 On The Round

**Total of 22 Penalties Handed Out, Chaisson Outstanding in Goal.**

The Devon Junior Tigers, made up of players from Devon, Fredericton and Barker's Point, edged the Bathurst Papermakers 4-3 here last night in 70 minutes of hockey, replete with thrills and what-nots, but fell one goal short of defeating the North Shore squad, on the round, as the paper six romped off with the odd marker in 15, and entered the N. B. Junior finals.

The game was played on fast ice, and both teams played themselves into exhaustion, and the series was always in doubt until the final goal rang. Mush Morehouse and Thibodeau handed out a total of 22 penalties, a record for a New Brunswick Junior playoff game, and this left both squads short in man power practically throughout the whole contest, wherein several players were injured and left the ice for repairs, as play was suspended on numerous occasions.

Cameron, tricky left-laner for the local squad, suffered a severe gash in the forehead as he slid into the goalpost. He returned to play later in the fray.

McIntyre, Wade, Mills and McDonald stood out on the attack for the Tigers, while Martin, husky rearguard with the invaders was the most effective man on the ice. Chaisson was really the star of the game, as the little net janitor bailed out the proverbial "ton of rubber," as raiding Tigers struck hard and often, and only for his classic display, the home forces would have rolled up an impressive victory.

**Tigers Outplay Papermen**  
Play opened fast and Burns had the initial peg at the Tiger citadel, but Scott handled the disc with ease. Chamberlain missed out on a solo dash as Mills cleared. Bathurst were showing a finished game. Wade, Cameron and McIntyre sped past the Bathurst defence but Chaisson out-guessed Wade. Cameron and Wade paired up and Chaisson made a miraculous stop. Myles and McLenahan witnessed by Martin, but the shot went astray. The home forces were out-playing the visitors, who were forced to shoot the length of the ice on several occasions.

At the 8:45 mark, Wade worried past the Papermaker's rearguard and rifled the disc by Chaisson for the initial score of the game. Play opened up and Martin was in on Scott, as the little net janitor bailed the disc to the side. The Tiger squad pressed again, and McIntyre sank the disc but the play was ruled offside. Toward the end of the period, Martin, husky rearguard, evened the play, as he beat Scott on a solo rush.

The middle canto opened with Bathurst a man short and the home team put on the pressure. McIntyre scored at the 5:45 mark after Myles had carried the disc in close. Play roughened up and players kept the penalty box filled up until the final gong. The final period was replete with thrills and spills and play was suspended on numerous occasions as players went off for repairs.

**Tie Up Series**  
Bathurst entered the period with a 6-5 lead on the round but Wade tied the series up at the two-minute mark in the period, as he picked up McLenahan's pass, while going at full speed and tossed the rubber by Chaisson on a smart play. Bathurst ganged Scott, and he was forced to stop five shots from close in. Mills gave the local squad a one-goal lead on the series at the 6:30 mark, but Schryer wiped out the lead 37 seconds later.

Cameron was in alone but shot by an open net and fell headlong into the goal post. He left for facial repairs but returned to the fray shortly afterwards. The Tigers were out-playing Bathurst as Mills, Myles, McIntyre, and Cameron missed out on several occasions as they ganged the Papermakers' citadel.

After the regular session of play the teams were deadlocked on the round, and 10 minutes of overtime was needed to settle the issue. Shortly after the session opened Bathurst sank the "monied" disc at the two-minute mark. The home team strove in vain to overcome the one-goal lead, but Bathurst tossed the water down the ice while Chaisson rose to dizzy heights in the Bathurst citadel.

## ROYAL PLAYERS SIGN CONTRACTS

MONTREAL, March 1—Four Royals have signed their contracts and returned them to the offices of the Montreal Baseball Club. Guy Moreau, business manager, announced last night that Ben Sankey, shortstop, and Marvin Duke, southpaw pitcher secured from the Yankees, have accepted terms.

Pitchers Russ Bauers and Johnny Wasco, two flingers coming on option from Pittsburgh, had previously signed their contracts. They will train with the Pirates at San Bernardino, Cal., joining Royals before the opening of the International League schedule.

Bernie Cobb, new first baseman, another Pirate farmer, will train with Royals at Orlando.

Manager Rabbit Maranville is at Miami, Fla., getting in a little early training for handling the managerial reins. He will move his belongings over to Orlando March 10, when the Royals' batterymen are slated to report. The infielders and outfielders will arrive March 15.

Guy Moreau will go South on March 7, along with Guy Gauvreau, travelling secretary. Hector Racine, president; Romeo Gauvreau, vice-president, and Lucien Beauregard, director, are in Europe at the present time. Mr. Racine will return in time to join the team at Orlando April 1.

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## JUNIOR, INTER-MEDIATE FINALS START TONIGHT

BATHURST, March 2—Hockey fans of this North Shore centre anticipate a tough battle tomorrow night when the Bathurst Papermakers will make their bid against Moncton Maroons for provincial senior crown.

The game will be the first of a two-game, total-goal series. The second game will be played at Moncton on Friday night.

Bathurst ice will be nothing new to Dud' James, coach of the Maroons and Ken Carroll, the veteran, who captains the Hub team, because both played for the Papermakers when that team won the Maritime title several years back.

After trimming Sackville with ease here in the N. B. semi-finals last Friday night the Papermen are confident of giving Maroons the toughest assignment they have yet had handed out to them.

NEW YORK, March 1—New York Yankees' first squad will go south today, but unless Col. Jacob Ruppert and pitcher Lefty Gomez get along better Gomez will be among the missing.

Gomez visited Ruppert yesterday to see what could be done about getting more than Ruppert's offer of \$12,000. The Colonel ended the conference in short order by telling Lefty there was no chance whatsoever. Gomez planned to visit Ruppert today and indicated that he may sign at Ruppert's terms in time to leave with the squad.

Lefty is holding out for \$15,000, according to Ruppert. The pitcher has been working under a two-year contract at \$20,000 a year, but was offered \$7,500 this year. Ruppert raised this to \$10,000 in his first conference with Gomez and to \$12,500 in the second.

Pitchers Red Ruffing, Monte Pearson and Jim Tobin and catcher Bill Dickey, all of whom are due in camp at St. Petersburg, Fla., have not come to terms.

## PONTIACS EDGE HUB SIX 3-2, LOSE ROUND 4-3

SAINT JOHN, March 2—A protested goal that would have tied up the N. B. Junior semi-final playoff here last night between Saint John Pontiacs and Moncton Wheelers gave the Hub six the round 4-3 although Pontiacs handed out a 3-2 defeat.

Pontiacs have entered protest to Frank Gallagher, president of the New Brunswick Hockey Association on the grounds that the goal was scored by Osborne and that referee-in-chief "Buzz" McLeod of Moncton was not in on the play to see it. McLeod disallowed the goal. The counter came near the end of the first period.

Accompanied with the protest and fee will be a sworn affidavit by the goal judge who flashed the red light as the puck went in. McLeod again called the play back on another goal scored by Coughlan of the Pontiacs previous to the protested goal.

Gallagher stated last night that he would await the report of both referees in Moncton and act accordingly. Should Gallagher decide in favor of the Wheelers the Pontiacs will take their claim to the Maritime Hockey Association.

Several spectators declared that the goal scored by Osborne, which was the second one disallowed, crossed the goal line before being deflected outside the cage.

## COWLEY HEADS MARITIME LIST IN N.H.L. SCORES

MONTREAL, March 2—Boston's Bill Cowley found himself at the top of Maritime National Hockey League scorers tonight, one point ahead of Toronto's high scoring rookie Gordie Drillon of Moncton, with whom he shared first place last week.

Last week was a quiet one for scores and Cowley's two points were enough to break the tie. The former Halifax Wolverines now has 30 points compared with Drillon's 29.

**SUN** in third place is Cowley's teammate Ray Getliffe, who played amateur hockey in Saint John and Charlottetown. His 25 points gave him a three-point lead over Eddie Wiseman of Newcastle, N.B., little sparkplug of the luckless New York Americans.

Not yet able to come out of the scoring slump that has held him point less for nearly three weeks, Canadiens Joffre Desllets slipped farther behind the leaders with 18 points. The former Saint John player still can catch the pace-setters, but with less than a month to play he will have to do some high-powered scoring.

Farther down the list, Joe Lamb of Americans, Bill Hollett of Boston and Pete Kelly, Detroit, each picked up a point during the week, while Bill Miller of Canadiens continued to play brilliant hockey on the defence, though kept out of the scoring records.

## 'HAS-BEENS' FLOCK TO TRAINING CAMPS

NEW YORK, Mar. 1—Baseball's comeback artists, ageless, some penniless and full of dreams, are descending again on the major league training camps.

St. Louis Browns, for example, are taking pitcher John Fred "Sheriff" Blake to camp. The sheriff is as old as law and order, but there he is, in his 38th year, getting another tryout.

Boston Bees have filled their roster with familiar names and creaking knees. Pitcher Bill Harris, 36, and outfielders Frank McGowan, 35, who first went to a major league training camp in 1922, are two of the team's most promising "rookies." Both came up from Buffalo, where Harris won 15 and lost 11, and McGowan hit .358 and was voted the most valuable player in the International League.

Then there's Tony Rensa, veteran catcher, back with Chicago White Sox after spending 1936 with Dallas in the Texas League. Tony has been around since 1925.

**Another Trial**  
The now famous \$123,000 infelder, Bill Cissell, gets another trial, this time with Philadelphia Athletics. Cissell has been with Cleveland, Boston Red Sox, Portland and Baltimore since the late Charlie Comiskey paid out good money to bring him to the White Sox.

Cincinnati Reds are counting on three young players who were up before and then kicked down. They are outfielders Phil Weintraub and Jack Rothrock, both from Rochester, and pitcher Dick "Oliver Twist" Barrett, who pitched for the Athletics and Bees.

## Bulldogs Capture N. S. Playoff Round

TRURO, N. S., March 2—Antigonish Bulldogs lacking the drive that carried them to the Nova Scotia senior championship for the last three years, held the Truro Bearcats to a 2-all draw here tonight to eliminate them from the playdowns. Bulldogs took the first game of a two-game total-goal series 7-3 and the round 9-5.

Police were called to the ice in the dying moments of the game when Bulldogs' Neil McKenna and goalie Mumford of Truro traded punches. Players and spectators piled into one another for five minutes, before order was restored.

## Old Timers Find Fame In Exile -- Somers With Mintos.

WINNIPEG, March 1—Forgotten men of hockey! They are to be found directing keen-eyed, eager youngsters in Saskatchewan's senior amateur circuits. One of them may guide the destinies of a western challenger for the Allan cup when play-down time rolls around this spring.

Out of the realm of missing men, Art Somers, Eddie Oatman, Percy Traub, "Gizze" Hart and the durable "Duke" Keats have found fame in exile. They are developing puck pupils who some day promise to scintillate after the fashion of their old masters.

Colorful Art Somers who carved vivid pages in hockey history as "Little Caesar" of New York Rangers has come back to life as unostentatiously as he dropped out back in 1934. The dark-haired dynamo is shaping ice fortunes of Prince Albert Mintos, top-bracketed prides of Saskatchewan's northern loop.

Oatman, former resident of Minneapolis and another of the West's illustrious sons, is responsible for the pleasing showing of Yorkton Terriers. He is better remembered as a member of Victoria Cougars in the old Pacific Coast Professional League and later as manager of Minneapolis Millers and St. Paul in the Central League.

Regina Vics, in the Southern Saskatchewan division, point with no donable pride to "Duke" Dutkowski who at one time or another saw service with a majority of clubs in the National Hockey League. Percy Traub, considered by many one of the finest of all defence players, preps an up-and-coming Regina amateur club.

Memories of "Newsy" Lalonde, "Rusty" Crawford and other hockey greats that made up the roster of the old Western Canada League would not be complete without "Gizze" Hart and "Duke" Keats. The tireless energy that featured their active playing days is reflected in their coaching ability.

Hart, coach of Wayburn Beavers, has hustled his charges into a play-off spot in the southern division that includes Moose Jaw Millers, Yorkton, Regina Aces and Vics. The fiery and aggressive Keats, who rounded out a lengthy professional career with Edmonton Eskimos, has directed playing policies of Saskatoon Quakers in the northern loop.

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
