He referred to the financial statement, pointing that with the added burden of relief imposed on the city last September by the government which withdrew its support the auditor's report was a favorable one.

POPULATION IN CAPITAL SHOWS INCREASE 1,305

The population of Fredericton has shown a more rapid increase in the past six years than it had during the previous twenty-nine years, according to figures submitted at a meeting of the committee of the whole council held last evening in Mayor Kitchen's office. Figures show that the population at the beginning of the present year was 10,135; increase of 1,305 over the last official census taken in 1931, and increase of 3,018 since the year 1901 at which time the census revealed a total population of

The total female population is 4,999, while the male population is 4,436. The former figures show an increase of 563 over the latter. The female population includes 1,313 children, and 3,686

Adult males number 3,004, and children 1,432. There are 119 more male children than female children.

In addition to the total 10,135 population, there are 700 students who reside here. These, however, are not included in the census. The recent census was compil-

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
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
