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
CBC TO PRESENT THRILLING DRAMA OF FOREST FIRE

MONTREAL, Sept. 4-The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation will present over its eastern network at 6.30 p.m. EST, September 4, a re-enactment of the thrilling drama of a great forest fire. The dramatization, to be called 'Fire in the Wilderness'", will be based on actual scenes and events of the recent fire season and will feature an acting cast with Robson Black, Vice President and Manager of the Canadian Forestry Association, as narrator.

Every summer hundreds of forest fires wage continuous warfare with fire protective organizations. Few of these stirring combats come within sight of cities and towns and public knowledge of the meaning of wholesale forest destruction is fragmentary. "Fire in the Wilderness", which was written by Mr. Black, will portray the

scenes that unfold from a hilltop overlooking a raging fire. The movements of the ranger forces, the roar of the portable pumps, and the crash of falling trees will enter vividly into the dramatization.

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
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
