Word was received from Bathurst today that the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company, Limited, has taken over 57 claims staked in the Millstream district, 15 miles from Bathurst; by Hon. C. T. Richard, provincial secretary-treasurer, and associates. Valuable deposits of lead and zine containing a proportion of gold, silver and copper are to be found in the district. The smelting company plans immediate development of the property, it was stated.

In the meantime work is continuing on the Nigadoo Gold Mine property. Recent assays show a high percentage of the precious metal. Diamond drilling and other exploratory work is being carried on. Mr. Richard is a director of the company.
