### CHARGE WITHDRAWN

A charge of non-support against a local man was withdrawn in police court this morning. The case was to have been taken up but the complainant decided to withdraw the charge.

### TO PENNSYLVANIA

The body of Miss Heradah Newsome, Chester, Pennsylvania school teacher who met death in a car accident at Taymouth, York County, yesterday afternoon is being forwarded to Pennsylvania this evening. It is now resting at McAdam's Funeral Home.

### VISITS STATION

J. C. Veness, superintendent of the Dominion forestry branch here, visited the Acadian Forestry Experimental Station on official business today. He was accompanied there by D. A. MacDonald, assistant Dominion forester, Ottawa, who arrived here Tuesday.

### CONDITION FAVORABLE

The condition of Miss Sarah McCartney, who was injured in a car accident at Taymouth yesterday afternoon, was reported this afternoon as favorable. She is a patient in the Victoria Public Hospital. Her companion, Miss Heradah Newsome was killed. Both young women were residents of Chester, Penn.

### DIES AT TAYMOUTH

The death occurred this morning at Taymouth of Mrs. Isobel McBean at the home of her nephew, Roy McBean. Mrs. McBean was the widow of Elijah McBean, and had resided at Taymouth for about 25 years. She passed away after an illness of nearly five months, at the age of 85 years. She is survived by a number of nephews and nieces, and her passing will be mourned by many old friends of the district.

### OFFICIAL HERE

D. A. MacDonald, assistant Dominion forester, Ottawa, arrived here this evening to spend three or four days at the Acadian Experimental Forestry Station in Sanbury County as a guest of E. G. Saunders, superintendent. He will inspect the station as well as other federal forest service work in this district and the Maritimes. It is likely also he will visit the new forest fire hazard research station on the Fannagan Road in this city, which recently began operation in charge of federal officials.

### DEEDS RECORDED

The Daily Mail stated a few days ago that the Irving Oil Company had purchased the Queen Street properties of Mrs. J. J. McCaffrey and the estate of the late Mrs. Margaret Hughes. In that connection, it was learned that the deeds of the two properties have been recorded. It is understood that negotiations are pending for the purchase of the brick building, situated at the corner of Queen Street and Court House Square, adjoining the two properties mentioned. The building is owned by Thomas W. Rainford.

### INVESTIGATE FIRE

Royal Canadian Mounted Police are investigating the fire yesterday at Oromocto which burned 31 cords of pulpwood belonging to Jack McDonald of that place. The wood was piled along the road near his home, and was ignited in the night. The fire was apparently of incendiary origin, either gasoline or kerosene being used, and the pile being ignited in three places. Motives for the fire are unknown. The owner knows no reason why anyone should wish to injure him in any way, so it is believed that mischief lies behind the act.

## CABINET SESSION

## 3,000 DELEGATES TO ATTEND GRAND LODGE CONVENTION

I.O.O.F. Annual Meeting Opens In This City On August Ninth

### THE PROGRAMME

Plans are about completed for the annual sessions of the Grand Lodge I.O.O.F., Rebekah Assembly and Grand Encampment which commence here on August 9th. More than 3,000 persons are expected to attend the annual conference which is expected to be one of the largest gatherings of its kind ever held in the Maritime Provinces. Delegates will be present from Newfoundland as well as from all sections of the seacoast provinces. The local lodge is making extensive preparations to entertain the visiting delegates and the general arrangements are under the supervision of Karl A. Walker.

Registration begins on Monday morning, Aug. 9, at the Parliament buildings, and will be continued throughout the day until 7.30 p.m., when a past presidents' conference will be preceded by a Rebekah Assembly degree at the armories here. The convention dance will be held at the I.O.O.F. hall at 9 p.m., when all will have an opportunity to become acquainted.

The opening session of the 35th annual session of the Rebekah Assembly at the armories will begin at 9 a.m. on Tuesday, Aug. 10, when the seating of the officers by Imperial Rebekah Lodge, No. 102, will be completed. This will be a public session.

At 10 a.m. the 46th annual session of the Grand Encampment will open in the Oddfellows' hall on Carleton street. At 2.30 p.m. the second session of the Rebekah Assembly will be held at the armories and the Grand Encampment at Oddfellows' hall.

J. H. T. Nicholson, P.G.M., will command the Rebekah Assembly degree of chivalry at the Canadian Legion grounds at 7 p.m. The Canton degree will begin at the I.O.O.F. hall at 8 p.m., and a special meeting of the Grand Lodge degree will be held in city hall at the same time. Beginning at 8 p.m. the staff of Imperial Lodge, No. 102, will conduct the Rebekah degree at the armories. A reception and social, open to all members of the order, will follow.

On Wednesday morning the opening session of the 80th annual Grand Lodge meeting will be held at City Hall at 9 o'clock, and at 9.30 a.m. the Rebekah Assembly will meet at the armories, followed by a Grand Lodge civic reception at city hall. The convention memorial service will be held on Saturday afternoon in Wilmot United Church, preceded by a parade, headed by the Moncton Oddfellows' Band and including several others. A memorial wreath will be placed by Grand Master Wood at the cenotaph. Following the service a garden party will be held at Ashburnham Place, when the Countess of Ashburnham will be hostess.

At 7 p.m. a smoker will be held for Grand Lodge officers, past grand officers and incoming district deputy grand masters in the Lodge room on Carleton street. At 7.30 p.m. the last session of the Rebekah assembly will be held at the armories, and at 8 p.m. the second session of the Grand Lodge at city hall. There will be a dance at 9 p.m.

On Thursday the convention will conclude. At 9.30 a.m. the Grand Lodge will meet again at city hall, and at the same time the Rebekah district deputies will meet at Oddfellows' Hall. The final session of Grand Lodge will be held at 2 p.m.

## \$35,000 IN TAX REVENUE RECEIVED AT CITY TREASURY OFFICE ON WEDNESDAY

Large Number Citizens Pay As Discount Date Closes

### TOTAL RECEIPTS

In Discount Period Last Season Revenue Was \$198,703

Citizens taking advantage of the discount period on city taxes, which closes today, yesterday paid \$35,000 into the city coffers. This final rush to secure the 5% discount offered has kept the staff at the office of the City Treasurer working overtime for the past few days. A steady flow of people in and out of the building has made it the busiest spot in the city for the while at least.

Although no definite figures can be secured yet for amounts received during the whole period, it is expected that they will compare favorably with the figures of last year. Total receipts for the discount period last year showed the figure of \$198,703 for the total time.

It is believed that yesterday's receipts have set a record for tax collections in one day, although receipts today were also large. No figures can be secured on today's receipts, due to the fact that the staff is so over-worked that no posting can be done.

Most of the larger tax payers wait until the last couple of days to turn their taxes over to the city. The greater percentage of receipts yesterday and today were from these sources.

## PENNSYLVANIA SCHOOL TEACHER MEETS DEATH WHEN AUTOMOBILE OVERTURNS ON TAYMOUTH HIGHWAY

Miss Heradah Newsome Instantly Killed, Driver Injured

Enroute to her home in Chester, Pennsylvania, after spending an enjoyable vacation on the Gaspé Peninsula, Miss Heradah Newsome, 26-year-old teacher of Chester High School, met instant death on the highway near Taymouth yesterday afternoon when the car in which she and a companion were riding, overturned and crashed into a telegraph pole. Miss McCartney, who was driving the car, is now a patient in the Victoria Public Hospital suffering from severe shock and bruises. The full extent of her injuries cannot be determined until the results of the X-ray examinations are known. Her condition was regarded today as satisfactory.

Miss Newsome suffered a broken neck and fracture of the skull. Death was believed to have been instantaneous. Coroner Dr. Charles MacKay, who with R.C.M.P. Corporal Ryder, decided an inquest was unnecessary. The body was brought to McAdam's Funeral Home pending arrangements for its shipment to Pennsylvania. F. C. Johnson, American vice-consulate here, is supervising the necessary arrangements.

The accident occurred when the left rear tire on the Chevrolet roadster in which they were riding "blew-out." The car swerved to the left side of the road, and Miss McCartney endeavored to right it. However, the vehicle plunged into the ditch, crashing headlong into a telegraph pole. When it came to a standstill the car was facing the opposite

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## N. Y. LAWYER PAYS TRIBUTE TO N.B. HOSPITALITY

Enjoys Fishing Sport In Northern Section Of Province

Theodore V. W. Anthony, barrister of Newburgh, N. Y., recently completed a fishing trip to Northern New Brunswick and, judging by an appreciative letter from him to the New Brunswick Government Bureau of Information and Tourist Travel, evidently was well treated and had plenty of sport. He says that in going over a government publication entitled "Fish and Hunt in New Brunswick," he found the name of Duncan V. Reed of St. Almo, Victoria County. Correspondence resulted and here is what happened as Mr. Anthony tells it:

"I have recently spent a week with Mr. Reed and have difficulty in saying too much in his favor. He and his wife and family couldn't have treated me better if I had owned the place. His salmon pools are good and I got my share out of them. The food is good and there was plenty of it. My room was entirely satisfactory and the whole place was as clean as a pin."

In referring to a trip to the North Shore area, Mr. Anthony has this to say: "Another place where I had the finest sort of treatment was at Mrs. Edmund Robertson's. Mrs. Robertson runs a store and filling station where your route No. 17, (Campbellton and St. Leonard Highway) crosses the Upsalquitch. Her husband owns a pool just above the bridge where he permits fishing. I got my share of salmon and grise there too."

direction from which they had been travelling. It was badly damaged. There were no eye-witnesses to the accident. The crash was first discovered by Mr. and Mrs. Sydney Thompson, Chipman, who were driving along the same road. Mr. Thompson, together with Keith and Grey Edney and Walter MacNuttie, removed the bodies from the wreckage and medical aid was immediately summoned.

Dr. MacKay in his examination of the victim found she had suffered a broken neck, a fracture of the skull, severe lacerations about the head and both right forearm bones broken. He also discovered that the car was proceeding at a moderate rate of speed and he expressed the view that because it was an open car was in a large measure responsible for the death.

Following the accident, Dr. C. G. Folkins arrived on the scene. He also examined the body of the victim. In the meantime, the injured woman was rushed to the hospital in an unidentified car bearing Quebec license plates.

## TAKE UP CLAIMS

Word was received from Bathurst today that the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company, Limited, has taken over 57 claims staked in the Millstream district, 15 miles from Bathurst, by Hon. C. T. Richard, provincial secretary-treasurer, and associates. Valuable deposits of lead and zinc containing a proportion of gold, silver and copper are to be found in the district. The smelting company plans immediate development of the property, it was stated.

In the meantime work is continuing on the Nigadoo Gold Mine property. Recent assays show a high percentage of the precious metal. Diamond drilling and other exploratory work is being carried on. Mr. Richard is a director of the company.

## DEMAND GREATER THAN SUPPLY IN PORK INDUSTRY

Swine-raising Offers Great Possibilities In Province

### FOREIGN MARKETS

Swine-raising in New Brunswick offers great possibilities to farmers, according to officials of the provincial agricultural department who stated this phase of agriculture was, in many cases, being neglected by the farmers. The supply does not meet the demand in this province, and there is a great field for development in that branch of livestock breeding.

In addition to the domestic demand, British markets also offer great possibilities. During the past few months many farmers have shipped pork to the United Kingdom and favorable prices were received. The provincial department of agriculture is interested in the development of swine-raising and every encouragement is given farmers to develop the industry on a larger scale.

Within a short time, it is expected that department officials will have announcements to make regarding marketing conditions and the future possibilities for further development of the industry.

Questioned today regarding the 'pork' situation, Hon. A. C. Taylor, provincial minister of agriculture, stated that he could make no statement at the present time. He, however, intimated that an announcement regarding the matter will be made within the next few weeks.

Asked by newspapermen to advance an opinion on the possibilities of a successful crop this season, Hon. Mr. Taylor said he was not prepared to do this until he had made a careful survey of the province. He said that he planned making a provincial tour next week in which he would study agricultural conditions in all sections of the province.

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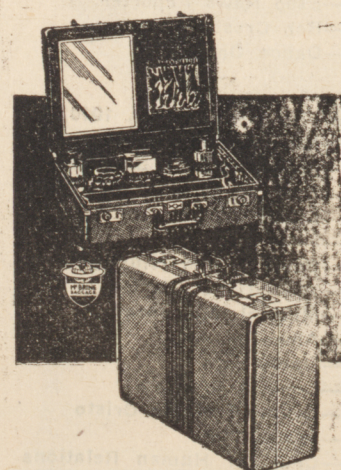
