Indecent Shows

THE DISGRACEFUL SHOW PUT ON IN ONE OF THE TENTS ON THE Midway of the Exhibition this week and which was referred to in The Daily Mail of Wednesday last was continued again on Thursday and last evening. It is said that after the article appeared in The Daily Mail that some of these women who took part in the show were induced to don a few clothes. The Daily Mail has received congratulations from clergymen and others in this city in regard to the article we published showing up the immoral performance given by the four dilapidated venuses in the backroom tent. Others have told us that our article was the best advertisement that this indecent show could have received. We were surprised, however, that the day following the article we re-, ceived a telephone call from a woman who figuratively spanked us with a slipper, because we published the article regarding this disgraceful feature of the midway at our exhibition. She told us that her husband had attended the show and that from his account our article was entirely overdrawn. In reply to this we wish to state that not only was our article not overdrawn, but decency and a regard for our readers prevented us from publishing the full details of what took place in the backroom of this show in which these four women danced about absolutely stark naked except for a pair of slippers. When The Daily Mail publishes articles of this kind we are first sure of our facts and the facts regarding this show can be fully verified by witnesses who were present on Tuesday night. What went on during the following nights we are not in the position to verify.

As we stated on the previous occasion such disgraceful exhibitions are not endorsed by the larger majority of the citizens of Fredericton. The matter of allowing such shows to continue night after night in this city is a challenge to the better thinking people of Fredericton. It shows how far we allow things to go without being checked up. Any of these people can come into the city and get away with almost anything, except possibly murder. And this is a city of eight Christian Churches and the Educational Center of the province. These things are carrried out, however, in spite of the churches and their being allowed to go on is a slap in the face to the better thinking citizens of Fredericton.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18-Gold imports dropped precipitately in August, reversing a trend that has poured \$5,000,000,000 worth of the metal into the United States in less than four years.

The Commerce Department reported today that they fell to \$63.000,000 by comparison with monthly totals that had not been less than \$121,000,000 since the first of the year and had ranged as high as \$262,000.000.


