ON THE C.B.C.

"The Dixieland Minstrels"

The Dixieland Minstrels will go on the air from the CBC Toronto studios tonight at 9.00 p. m. EST with another characteristic variety show, highlighted with special arrangements by Russ Gerow, played by the Dixieland Orchestra, under the direction of Geoffrey Waddington.

Stellar artists billed for this date in support of Bryant Fryer, who is cast as "Mr. Andrews", the interloper, will include Andy Purman, colored mimic and script writer, who will sing a specially arranged version of the time honored Bert Williams hit, "The Moon Shines in the Moonshine"; Lloyd Bullen, the well known radio bass baritone, who will be heard in "Gypsy Sweetheart"; Gilbert MacLean, tenor, singing "Sylvia" one of the world's best known songs.

The orchestra will take the spotlight for "Dusty Trombones", written by Henry Fillmore and a swing setting of the old favourite, "When the Moon Is Shining Down in Alabama." Smart blackface patter, an original sketch by Purman and a tap dance novelty will round out the program which will be heard over the national network.

"Southern Rhapsody"

The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation national network will feature a special Sunday night broadcast from the Toronto studios on Sunday, September 19, from 9.00 to 9.30 p. m. EST, under the direction of Percy Faith. The program, "Southern Rhapsody," will feature Dorothy Alt, popular interpreter of song, Adolph Wantroff, the Russian-Canadian baritone, and a twenty-three piece modern symphonic orchestra under the Faith baton, with a dramatic cast and vocal chorus in support.

The entire program, specially arranged by Percy Faith, has been designed to contrast in music and dramatic incident the traditional Old South and the modern tempo of contemporary colored life in the cotton country. Highlights of the music program include: "Down South", "Basin Street Blues", "Old Zip Coon", "Swanee River", "St. Louis Blues", "Ol' Man River", "O Susannah", and "Goin' Home." Three negro spirituals will be arranged for chorus and orchestra: "It's Me, O Lord," "Deep River" and "Steal Away."

Recollections of Yesteryear

A chorus of twelve mixed voices under the direction of Roland Todd, accompanied by Ernest Dainty at the organ, will sing familiar songs and ballads on the CBC presentation "Recollections of Yesteryear," to be heard over the national network on Wednesday, September 22, at 10.30 p. m. EST.

An unusual arrangement will be heard when Albert Pratz, prominent violinist and recently soloist with the Promenade Symphony Orchestra, plays a number of melodic interpolations during the offerings by the chorus.

Pratz will interpolate the following numbers: "On Wings of Song" during the presentation of "In the Shade of the Sheltering Palms" with special arrangement by Roland Todd; "May" during the singing of "Lassie O'Mine", and "Songs My Mother Taught Me" during the featuring of "The Sweetest Story Ever Told." The chorus accompanied by the organ will render "The Galway Piper" "Come to the Fair", "Swing Low Sweet Chariot" with special arrangements by Roland Todd, and the negro spiritual "Steal Away."

SPORTS, ADVENTURE ACCENTED IN NEW BICYCLE PROGRAMME

NEW YORK, Sept. 17—Outstanding figures in the worlds of sports and adventure will appear as guest artists each week in Bicycle Party, a new half hour variety program to be broadcast over the coast-to-coast NBC-Red Network beginning Sunday, September 26.

The program, to be heard Sundays from 3:30 to 4:00 p. m. EST, will feature regularly Bill Slater, NBC ace sports commentator, as master-of-ceremonies; an orchestra under the direction of Hugo Mariani, veteran NBC maestro; Bert Swor, a member of the original "Two Black Crows," and Lou Lubin, blackface comedy team; and Bert Whaley, young radio

baritone. Alois Havrilla will be the announcer.

The first guest, on September 26, will be Joe Williams, sport columnist of the Scripps-Howard Newspapers. He will describe the "back-stage" setting of important sports events.

Bill Slater, the master-of-ceremonies, is at home in a wide variety of sports announcing. Headmaster of the Adelphi Academy, Brooklyn, N.Y., he is frequently heard in his vivid style of describing football games, track-meets, crew races and other athletic contests. He was NBC's chief announcer at the Olympic Games in Berlin in 1936.

Miss George, a graduate of Wittenberg College and the American Conservatory, Chicago, began her career a year ago in the Chicago NBC studios singing with Walter Blaufuss's orchestra.

Eddie Cantor found out who his real friends are, last Sunday night when a mimic impersonating him appeared in the last of the summer series from Texaco Town.

Pinky Tomlin announced that Mayor Eddie Cantor will return to the CBS network, Wednesday, September 29, at 8:30 P. M. And, in accordance with a custom long established in the movies but new to radio, he would now present a trailer, an impersonator imitating Eddie Cantor singing "Now's The Time To Fall In Love." The impersonator did his bit and the program from the Coast went on to its completion. But the impersonator's offering apparently registered because several wires arrived from managers inquiring about his identity, offering him auditions. A movie company wanted to arrange a movie test.

Naturally all this interest caused a lot of talk—and talk gets around fast in Hollywood. So when Eddie arrived home, Ida and the Cantor girls greeted him with glum expressions. "Don't worry, Dad," they said, "just because one guy can imitate you so faithfully. That doesn't mean that your style isn't individual. Don't let them tell you that you're slipping.
