DUTIES OF CYCLISTS TOWARDS OTHERS

Remember that you cannot be certain of the movements of pedestrians. Be ready for children who may run suddenly on to the road and for people who may step from a refuge or footpath. Make allowance for the hesitation of the aged and infirm and for the blind.

Give plenty of room to pedestrians. Be prepared to meet pedestrians and led animals coming toward you on your own side of the road.

Take special care when passing a stationary vehicle or any other form of obstruction, which prevents a clear view of pedestrians or oncoming traffic.

When traffic in front of you is held up do not encroach on the off-side of the road and thereby impede other traffic.

Do not attempt to gain a forward position in a traffic block by riding along the narrow spaces between stationary vehicles.

Keep a straight course and do not wobble about the road.

Never ride close behind fast moving vehicles; always leave enough space to allow for their slowing down or stopping suddenly.

Never carry parcels or other articles which may interfere with your control of your cycle.

Never hold on to another vehicle.

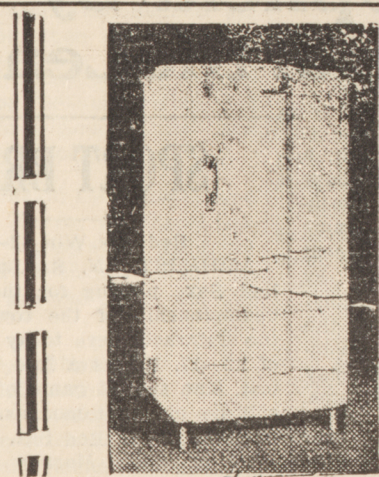
DOGS TO HAVE APARTMENT HOUSE
