LONDON, June 22-Contrary to expectations, the Canadian Cabinet ministers attending the Imperial Conference have not been seeking a chairman for the Royal Commission soon to be appointed to re-examine the financial and constitutional structure of the Dominion.

It is learned that no decision has been reached regarding the personnel of this commission, with a growing tendency to seek both the chairman and members in Canada.

Certainly there is no present thought of having a British chairman, although, when the matter is more actively canvassed at Ottawa, it may be decided to select one member from the United Knigdom. There has been much informal dis


