NEARLY 50 PERCENT ARE NOT ELIGIBLE

Special Committee Are Investigating the List

City Aldermen

Non - Committal When Asked For Views on Question

Nearly fifty per cent. of the 2,000 names contained in the petition circulated in protest against daylight saving time were found to be non-voters and ineligible to vote in a civic plebiscite, according to an announcement made today by officials of the special civic committee, appointed to investigate the question. Following a meeting of the city council yesterday afternoon which was held to consider the protest of the opponents of the proposal, the committee held a meeting and carefully investigated the names on the list.

The committee has not finished its work and no report will be available until later in the week. Although not officially stated, it is believed that the committee, under the chairmanship of His Worship Mayor G. W. Kitchen, will recommend a plebiscite to settle the question.

The action of the council authorizing the adoption of daylight time on June 26th has met with strong opposition from many citizens opposed to the scheme. The opponents of the proposal contend that the new time would cause considerable inconveni-

ence to business firms. The section of the city's population in favor of the adoption of daylight saving time during the summer has not voiced its opinion. The supporters have not taken any definite action to block the efforts of those opposed to the rejection of standard time.
