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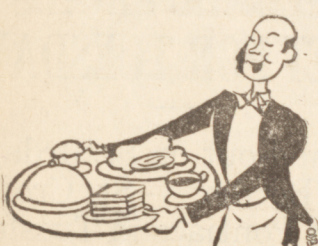

FOREST FIRE DANGER OVER, SAYS G. L. MILLER

All Fires Out As Heavy Rain Falls Over the Week-End

There is little danger of further forest fires this year, it was stated this morning by G. L. Miller, Chief Forester for the Province. Only an extended period of hot dry weather, which is highly improbable, will make the forest fire situation hazardous in the New Brunswick woods again this season.

Several fires are still being patrolled with crews of men burying the smouldering logs and other burning material, but the Forest Service officials consider that the danger is past.

The rain started Saturday morning. A total of nearly two inches had fallen up to last evening, with some rainfall this morning. The fires had been well under control, and this heavy rainfall has definitely extinguished them.

The Kedron Lake fire burned about 400 acres, stated J. Edwin Hall, assistant chief forester who has been in charge of fighting that blaze. Although this fire will be patrolled for some days, the fire-fighting crew is gathering up equipment in preparation for leaving the burned area.

lar and a half for his season ticket in order to bring his goods into this booth. If a local concern sells ice cream to parties in the exhibition it is not always convenient to send the one truckman to the exhibition with the ice cream. In this case any additional truckman that goes to the exhibition has to buy an additional ticket for a dollar and a half in order to take the provisions into the exhibition. It would seem that this could be avoided by the concern owning the booth and by those furnishing the provisions being provided with an attendant's ticket, certified by the employer and used by those who have occasion to use them for this purpose only. Otherwise it works a hardship and inconvenience to those who hold booths and also to the merchants and others outside who have occasion to convey provisions into those booths. The system seems to be a most unreasonable one, and is one that is adopted by most exhibitions.

If at any time a deficit takes place the city is asked for a grant to help cover this loss. This being the case, it is claimed that those who are citizens should be treated fairly.

REPAIRING CHURCH

A crew of men has started repairs of the masonry of the Brunswick Street Baptist Church. The weight of the steeple and the settling of the foundation had caused a small crack to appear in the stone. Scaffolding has been erected and repair work is going ahead rapidly.

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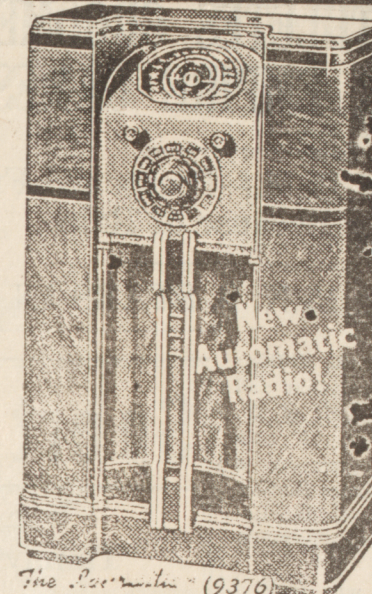
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
