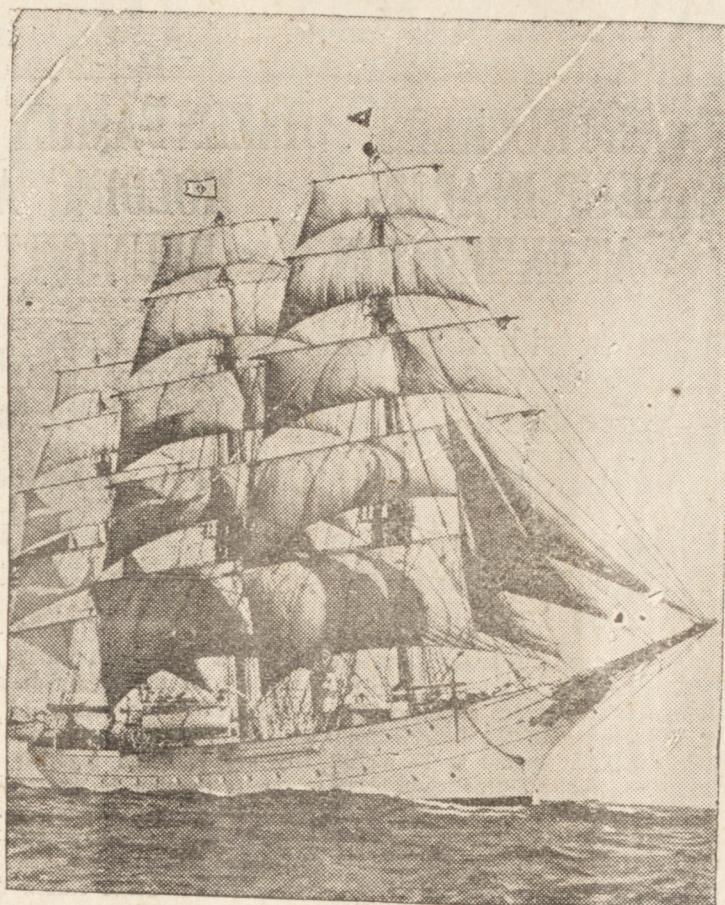

TWO UNKNOWN GERSHWIN TUNES TO BE SUNG BY SINGING LADY

NEW YORK, Sept. 11—Two unpublished songs of George Gershwin will be sung by Irene Wicker when she tells the story of the late composer on her Singing Lady broadcast over the NBC-Blue Network, Thursday, September 30, at 5:30 p. m., EST. Miss Wicker first heard of the songs during an interview with the composer shortly before his death. Gershwin, in giving her material on his childhood for a future Singing Lady broadcast, revealed that he had composed two songs when he was 12 years old. He declared that the songs, the first he ever wrote, were never published and that the manuscripts had been lost long since.

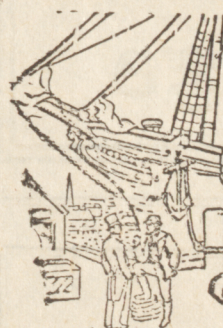

KATE SMITH BACK SEPTEMBER 30th

The popular Command Appearance which Kate Smith instituted last year, will be presented again on her new hour which debuts on the WABC-CBS network September 30, at 8:00 P. M., EST. It was announced today by Ted Collins, president of Kated, Inc.

On the forthcoming series, these awards for outstanding heroisms will be made monthly. Last year, when the Command Appearance was a weekly feature, so much mail arrived from listeners voting for their favored hero that it became an almost impossible task to arrive at a complete tabulation. The weekly mail averaged 135,000 letters. Also, for the first time in two and a half years, Kate Smith will be heard from coast to coast. This is expected to swell materially the total of listeners' response to the Command Appearances.

Nominees for the heroism award will be chosen from suggestions by the radio audience. A nominating committee composed of leading educators, newspapermen and social workers, will choose three people from those suggested. Their deeds will be dramatized on Kate's first program, September 30. The radio audience will be asked to vote for the one they consider outstanding.

ON THE C.B.C.

'Operatic Fantasia'
Cesar Borre, noted Belgian conductor and composer, will direct his symphony orchestra in a work to be performed for the first time on the CBC network, a fantasy on Saint-Saens opera "Samson and Delilah", to be broadcast over the CBC national network on Sunday, September 12, at 9:00 p. m. EST, during a presentation of "Operatic Fantasia". The program the fourth and last on the series, will originate from the Toronto studios. Jeanne LeBrun, soprano, will be the vocal soloist. Cesar Borre also will present excerpts from Puccini's famous Opera "Madame Butterfly", with the musical instruments taking the place of vocalists and choruses.

Mr. Borre has written many operatic compositions, starting when he was eighteen years of age. He is an outstanding authority on music and it was Belgium's loss and Canada's gain when Borre decided to make this country his permanent home.
