News Briefs

"TAKEN WITHOUT ASKING"

A car No. 8-512 registered in the name of Douglas T. Clark son of George H. Clark, chairman of the police commission was taken on Saturday from in front of a house on Westmorland Street, where it had been apparently parked by its owner. The car was recovered this morning in the city stoneyard by the city police who in this case showed considerable promptness in locating the car. At the police station this morning the Chief of Police stated that the car had not been stolen but that "it had been taken without the consent of the owner." The car belonging to Hon. A. C. Taylor, which was stolen some days ago has not been recovered.

HOSPITAL BOARD MEETING
A meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Victoria Public Hospital has been called for this evening. The meeting will take place at City Hall at 8 o'clock, with J. A. Reid, president of the board, presiding.

IN COURT THIS MORNING
Noah Fellow was sentenced to serve two months in the York County Jail when he appeared in court this morning, while Douglas Bradshaw pleaded guilty to the charge of having been intoxicated on a public street on Sept. 11. He was remanded until this afternoon.

CABINET TO MEET
A meeting of the provincial cabinet is called for tomorrow afternoon. It was announced this morning by J. Bacon Dickson, clerk of the executive council and deputy attorney general. Hon. A. A. Dysart, K. C., Premier and Minister of Public Works, is expected in this city some time late today.

Efforts Unsuccessful To Have Duck Season Opened on Wednesday

The efforts of a group of sportsmen in this district to have the duck shooting season open on the 15th of this month, will this year be unsuccessful, according to unofficial reports received this morning. The move was begun in hopes of having a more successful season in the northern and central part of the province, it being claimed that when the season opens, the greater part of the ducks in the Tobique country as well as on the North Shore around Tracadie and Tabusintac and in this area, have left for the more southern parts of the province.

The sportsmen in the Saint John area are in favor of a later season, the ducks then being most plentiful in that district. As it is at present, it is claimed that the Saint John sportsmen enjoy a fine duck shooting season, while the season is valueless to other sportsmen.

H. H. Ritchie, chief game warden for the Province of New Brunswick, today stated that although the question does not come under his department but falling under the Dominion Migratory Birds Act, and that he can issue no official statement on the matter, he believes that it is too late this year to have the ruling changed.

INFANTILE TOTAL INCREASES TO 52

Over Half of Cases Confined to City Of Saint John

Death At Plaster Rock This Morning — More Blood Donors Wanted—Eleven Serum Stations Established.

The number of cases of infantile paralysis in New Brunswick has increased from 39 reported up to press time Saturday to 52 at one o'clock today, it was stated this morning by Dr. William Warwick, chief medical health officer for the province. On Saturday, four new cases were reported at Saint John, while yesterday seven more were discovered in that city. One case was diagnosed at Moncton over the weekend, while the Saint John City total was increased to 27 by another case reported in that community this morning.

Three Deaths
Contrary to disturbing rumors which have been circulated in New Brunswick during the outbreak of the disease, there have been only three deaths out of the 52 discovered so far, it was announced by Dr. Warwick. One death has occurred at Saint John, another in Westmorland county, and a third reported this morning from Plaster Rock.

All the new cases are of the mild type which are easy to treat successfully with serum, it was stated. Not all the victims of the disease have been children, it was learned. At Saint John two of the cases were young women of 20 and 21 years of age respectively, while another patient is a youth of 19 years.

A drive is still being carried on by the Department of Health to locate possible blood donors, people who have had the disease during the past 10 or 15 years, and have recovered. A considerable quantity of serum is now available, but the department feels that it is necessary to prepare for every eventuality.

Serum Stations
Eleven serum stations have been established throughout the province. These are at Saint John, Moncton, Grand Falls, Chatham, Buctouche, St. Andrews, St. Stephen, Edmundston, Bathurst, Woodstock and Campbellton.

RAIN AND COOL WEATHER MAKE BETTER FISHING

Best Angling of Season Yet To Come—Salmon Seen Jumping at the Hart's Island Pool.

The rain received over the weekend, and further forecasts of wet weather will be a great boon to angling conditions in general, it is believed by sportsmen. The cooler weather of the past week and heavy rainfall has both cooled the temperature of the water and raised the level of the different streams, promising fine salmon angling for the remaining three weeks of the season.

It is reported that salmon have been seen jumping at Hart's Island Pool and at other salmon fishing grounds in the province, also that after a lull in the sport for many weeks a number of salmon are being taken by anglers along the river and on the Miramichi. Paul W. Richardson, New York stock broker who has been in the province fishing since August 27 reported a catch of four salmon and 2 grise last week.

Many other anglers who have been in the province for some time awaiting favourable weather condition now believe that their patience will be amply rewarded due to the change in the weather.

Best Fishing To Come
The consensus of opinion among guides on the different streams is that fine sport will be offered by the fall run of salmon which has already started. The salmon are running thickly despite the early date, and it is believed that with continued cool weather the finest angling of the present season is yet ahead.

It is believed that a considerable influx of American sportsmen will follow the favourable reports from the salmon pools, anxious to get in a period of angling before the season closes on Sept. 30th.

FINED IN R.C.M.P. DRIVE
John McArthur of Morrison's Mills was fined \$5 and costs on each of two counts, when he appeared in police court on Saturday. On the first charge he was fined for being intoxicated in a public place, and on the second, of raising a disturbance in a public place. The arrest came as a result of a drive being made by the Fredericton Detachment, R.C.M.P., upon drinking and unruly conduct at public dances. Arrest was made by Constable L. B. Matchett at a dance at New Maryland.

BOY BRAVES COPS TO GET PASS FIXED FOR MA

Midway All Set Up — Poultry and Flower Judging Today

Making his way through the main gates of the Fredericton Exhibition this morning, fearless of infantile paralysis or the efforts of a number of special constables to prevent his entrance, a nimble footed young boy gained admission to the office of C. L. Sypher, secretary of the exhibition corporation.

"Mister," the lad said breathlessly, "will ya charge the name on this pass to Ma's? It's no good to me now." Secretary Sypher genially assented just as the first of the corps of constables arrived in the doorway with an ominous look in his eyes. The lad was given a safe escort back through the gates.

This morning the exhibition opened full blast, the midway having been set up yesterday. Rain continued to delay the appearance of the citizens of Fredericton in any large numbers however. Continued showers are forecast for tonight and part of tomorrow.

Judging Today
Poultry judging occupied the limelight this morning, while the judging of floral exhibits was held this afternoon. The Five Albanis, having been delayed by immigration regulations, arrived here this afternoon. They will put on their featured show for the first time tonight, performing on motorcycles, trapezes and bars 75 feet above the ground.

About sixty horses were on hand this morning, with more to come, for the opening of the three day racing card. It is practically certain that the 11 year old track and Dominion mile record of 2:04 1/4 will go by the board tomorrow, on the first day of the meet, and with it the \$200 prize.

Races tomorrow are the 2:17 pace, the junior free for all or 2:11, and the 2:18 trot. The weekend's rain has improved the track considerably, it is understood.

Progress Being Made On New C.N.R. Subway

Slow but sure progress is being made in connection with the construction work on the subway at the lower end of town. The Richardson Construction Company Ltd., is still working on the main subway through to Waterloo Row. New steps are being constructed on both sides of the George Street Subway to enable pedestrians to go up and down town without breaking back at the steep hill at this crossing. It is probable that similar steps will be erected at Charlotte Street where the crossing is almost as bad, it is understood.

It is claimed by some of the key men of the Richardson Construction Company that the concrete subway nearest the station should have been back about twelve feet in the direction of the station. If present plans are followed, a dangerous blind intersection will be formed at the juncture of University Avenue and Brunswick Street, it was stated.

Considerable dissatisfaction has been expressed at the delay in finishing the subway near the bridge site. This delay, it was stated by officials of the contracting company, is due to frequent alterations in regard to the sidewalk and curbs which were requested by the City Engineer's department. There is no truth in the report that a tablet is to be erected at the George Street crossing bearing the names of those who were responsible for that piece of road construction, it has been learned.

LOCAL TRUCKERS ARE UP IN ARMS AT EXHIBITION

Claim Outsiders Given The Work While They Sit Idle

Another Grievance Delivery Drivers Are Charged for Bringing Goods Into Fair

A group of local truckmen who are paying a license to do business in the city of Fredericton are going to present a grievance to the City Council. Their complaint seems to be a just one. It is against the practice of bringing outside teams into the city during exhibition week to do cartage on the midway of the exhibition and to haul equipment to and from the station.

It is claimed by the local truckmen that the exhibition committee under the direction of the Transportation Committee of the Exhibition and the Executive of the Exhibition have imported truckmen from the outside surrounding country districts and from Devon to do this work whilst the truckmen in the city are taxed at the rate of two dollars per year per single team and three dollars per year for double teams. Our truckmen claim that they are not permitted to do any trucking in the town of Devon without paying a license and that it is only fair that where they pay a license in this city that they receive the protection of the city authorities against the infringement of teams from the outside areas. They state that even if the exhibition authorities feel like going to outside sources for their trucking that the city should step in and give protection to the local truckmen.

The truckmen say that a numbering system is used by the foreman in charge of the transportation at the exhibition. They also claim that the imported teams were given the lower numbers and it is claimed by the truckmen that as these lower numbers were given the first preference, the first team was able to deliver its load and return for a second load before the local teams which had higher numbers had entered the rotation.

Another grievance is this:—When a concern has a booth at the exhibition this concern is obliged to pay a dollar and a half for a season ticket for each attendant at the booth. In addition to this the truckmen who bring the ice cream or the bread or any other article required in connection with the booth has to pay a dollar.
