Wilmot Y.P.S. Entertaining Program

A rather unusual and most entertaining program was presented last evening by the Dramatic Committee of the Wilmot Young People's Society, under the leadership of Miss Marjorie Erb. Perhaps that which added further to the enjoyment was a series of illustrative addresses presented by the Oxford Group, under Misses Hazel DeLong, Gertrude Parsons and Grace Goodspeed, and being based mainly upon the subject 'A New Life in Christ.' The Oxford Group is well-known throughout Fredericton as well as several other cities and towns of the Dominion. The Oxford Group is not a new religion that leads us from the church, but a more helpful foundation which brings us in closer and more helping contact with the church. To the many who have gone to the Oxford Group meetings has come a more firm and resolute belief in Jesus Christ and the Group has been a great source of aid to those who had not found God. A solo, Thy Will Be Done, was capably rendered by Vernon Box, followed by a charming piano duet, Japanese Fan Dance, by Miss Marjorie Erb and Miss Hazel Caldwell. A number of humorous readings were given by J. Barry Allen. During the business period it was decided that the next evening's program be under the charge of the Social committee. The remainder of the entertainment was then taken over by Herbert Dayton. Basing his remarks on the well-known Sunday night radio feature, 'Do You Want to be an Actor?' Herbert Dayton provided a humorous and enjoyable entertainment. The scenes taken were two from the motion picture scripts of 'Go West Young Man' and 'Labelled Lady.' With himself as director, the audience choosing the cast, and Miss Gertrude Parsons as the casting director from the movie studios, Miss Nan Davton was chosen by the judges as the best of the evening, giving a very excellent and close portrayal of Mae West's role in Go West Young Man, and was followed by honors for the gentleman going to Burns Branch, who characterized Randolph Scott's role in the same film. An enjoyable recreational period brought the evening to a close.

Fredericton Science Club Meeting

With about 35 members and guests present, the club met at the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Neville, 69 Lansdowne Street, in a most interesting meeting. After confirming the minutes of the preceding meeting, a letter was read from the secretary of the Home and School Association requesting the appointment of an Educational Secretary to meet with a proposed Home and School Council. The present secretary was requested to add this to his functions.

Maor F. A. Good appeared as a delegate from the York and Sunbury Historical Society with a proposal for the Science Club to join with the Y. and S. in a picnic meeting to Grand Lake in some commemoration of Benjamin Tibbets, the first to apply the compound steam engine to marine uses. A committee of W. K. Kesson and G. Alva Good was appointed by the chair to contact a similar committee of the Y. and S.

The chairman, President R. P. Gorham, then introduced the speaker of the evening, Rofe K. Nevers, whose subject was to be Visual Education. Mr. Nevers explained that the subject as he would deal with it would be more accurately "Visual Aids to Education" and he proposed to confine himself entirely to the use of the moving picture. (Later in his talk, he showed that there is no such thing as a "moving picture" about this, the illusion of motion being given by a series of "stills," successive stages of motion being shown too rapidly for the eye to see complete picture to be grasped before being followed by another.)

The use of motion pictures as aid to teaching science subjects was being rapidly introduced all over the world, Great Britain using it possibly more than any other country. In a school at Hendon a moving picture projector is located in each classroom. In Germany 10,000 projectors were in use in August, 1936. The Canadian Government has its own moving picture bureau, as does the province of Ontario. Acadia University has an excellent projector and film library and the City of Fredericton has a projector of very high quality which is in use in some school every day.

As far as results go the success of moving pictures in advertising and as an aid to teaching can hardly be compared, the first showing its effects almost at once in increase of sales while the latter can only be realized after the lapse of a dozen years. Experimental psychological investigation has demonstrated an increase of 25 to 40 per cent. in teaching value, in respect to ease of comprehension and retentiveness of impression in comparison with study without the moving picture aid. Of course, it must be realized that only certain subjects are capable of assistance in this way.

George Howie then demonstrated with a projector very similar to that in use in the schools, some uses of Caterpillar Tractors and a film along purely educational lines was shown. In moving a vote of thanks, Maor Good, of the Provincial Normal School, prophesied that it would be a very few years before this most vivid method of demonstrating would be in general use in the schools.

The hostess, assisted by Mrs. A. R. Miller and Mrs. Guy Pond served refreshments and Miss Marcelle Gorham, accompanied by Mrs. Gorham, played on the violin and led some general singing before the meeting dispersed.

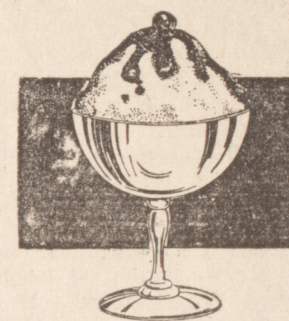

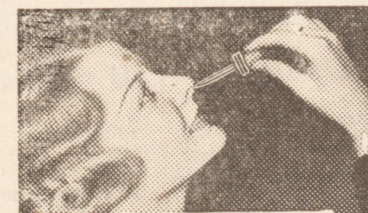

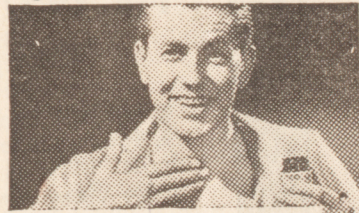
