### MEDICAL SERVICE C. N. R. CAR HAS ARRIVED MONCTON

MONCTON, Nov. 18—The specially equipped medical service car which has been assigned to the lines of the Canadian National Railways in Eastern Canada has arrived in Moncton in charge of Dr. Louis P. Robert, recently appointed travelling medical examiner for the railway. While in Moncton Dr. Robert will conduct medical examinations including eye and ear tests of trainmen and engineers.

Employees connected with the Canadian National train services are required to undergo periodical tests as to physical and mental fitness. The same applies to sleeping and dining car employees to ensure their freedom from communicable diseases as a protection for the patrons of the railway. All water supplies, including drinking water on trains, are also subjected to periodical examination to ensure their purity.

## WORE OUT 4 PENS AUTHORIZING PRO-GRAMME SCRIPTS

CHICAGO, Nov. 19—Harry Lawrence, author of 6 year old Kaltenmeyer's Kindergarten, heard Saturday at 6.30 A.M. over the NBC-Red Network, completed his 520th consecutive week as a script writer and gag man Thursday, November 11. He has had radio shows on the air for the past ten years.

Lawrence, who was born in Carrollton, Mo., July 6, 1897 started as a staff writer for the present NBC station WENR, on November 11, 1927 after leaving the old Chicago Evening Post, where he became famous as "High Frequency Harry," radio columnist.

Soon after joining WENR, he originated what is believed to be one of the first "family scripts" on the air. It was The Smith Family, which ran for two and one-half years on WENR, WMAQ, now also owned by NBC, and NBC affiliate WLS. In the cast of The Smith Family were Irma Glen, now a well-known NBC network organist, and Marian and Jim Jordan, now famous as Fibber McGee and Molly.

In those early days Lawrence also wrote a comedy sketch, "Uncle Adam and Little Eva," starring Miss Glen and Bruce Kamman, who is now Professor August Kaltenmeyer.

Other Lawrence sketches included Romance Time, The Hoffinghams, The Farm and Home Bugle, still on the NBC Farm and Home Hour after five and one-half years, and the Kaltenmeyer show, which recently celebrated its sixth anniversary.

In the past ten years the NBC gagster has worn out two typewriters four fountain pens and approximately 7,000 erasers, which he buys by the box. In his spare time Lawrence is writing a book about radio, which will either appear under the intriguing title, "You Don't Have to be Crazy—But It Helps," or "What to Do 'Til the Sponsor Comes."

His feet relax on a special footstool. The script rests on a rack constructed according to his specifications. Even his elbows are supported by the arms of the chair. "I still have to exert myself to sit up straight and talk," jests Skolsky "but some day I'll figure out a way to get around that too."

There is a serious reason, however why the columnist goes on the air with such luxurious ease.

"I want my listeners to feel that I am a friend who is chatting with them at their fireside and I wouldn't think of trying to create that kind of an atmosphere while standing before a mike or sitting in a hard studio chair," he explained.
