\$20,000 OFFERED FOR PROPERTY OF REID ESTATE

Metropolitan Store Aims to Build Cafe On Queen St.

Other Changes in Line Chain Stores Are Routing Our Local Merchants

Amongst important news concerning property transfers on Queen St., it is mentioned today that the Bank of Nova Scotia is after the "Wooden Block" immediately below their bank building. This building, which adjoins the Calder property, recently demolished, is owned by the estate of the late John Reid, and is in control of Mrs. Chas. Bliss of Oromocto, and of her sister, Mrs. D. Seelye of Margerville.

It is understood that the bank has offered \$20,000 for the property. It is also understood that the Metropolitan Stores have made an offer for the Bank of Nova Scotia (Stone) building, which is immediately below their establishment. It is said, that the Metropolitan aim at the expansion of their premises, so as to include the opening of a tea-room in connection with their building.

Another report is that another "chain store," the "Woolworth outfit" also aim at expansion. This concern has made an offer for the Twining building in which they are now located and which belongs to the Marchioness of Donnegal of Ireland. This deal has practically gone through, a move that will force the Fleming Est., to seek other quarters.

These rumors go to show how the "chain stores" are rapidly expanding at the expense of the local business man.

GOVERNMENT MEETS
The provincial government will meet here this evening. Hon. A. A. Dysart, the premier, came in from Montreal at noon today. Hon. F. W. Pirie, Minister of Lands and Mines hopped down here from Grand Falls this morning. Other members of the provincial cabinet will arrive from Saint John and other points this evening in time to connect up with the meeting which opens tonight. As outlined in yesterday's Daily Mail it is probable that the programme for the coming session of the Legislature will be gone into.

RESIDENTS ARE PESTERED BY PANHANDLERS

Many Complaints Registered by Local Housewives

Action Needed Transients Follow Systematic Routine in Canvassing

Residents of this city, including many charitably disposed persons seemed to be about fed up in regard to the matter of tramps calling at their houses day after day and night after night looking for a hand-out. The annoying part of the matter is, that the same tramps make a habit of calling at the same houses. In one particular location in this city where there are some very fine residences, two tramps work together each evening between five and six o'clock. They make a canvass of the street, one taking one side of the road, and the other the opposite side. One, who is a tall chap with a grey cap, invariably asks for ten cents which will procure him a bed for the night. In many cases where the men are out and the women are in the house alone, these women are afraid of the tramps and the whole situation is getting to be a nuisance. Some other means will have to be adopted to relieve the situation. The charitable public have naturally a certain amount of sympathy for these transients who are out of work. At the same time some systematic way of handling this problem should be devised by the authorities, and these men kept on the move. Sooner or later this problem will have to be dealt with, as there are 20,000 men in the same situation at the same time. It has been discovered that many citizens charitably disposed have been imposed upon by chaps coming to the door and begging ten cents at each house until enough money was secured so that it could be pooled in with other monies similarly secured and used to buy a nice little crock of booze. This is where the shoe pinches the man who gives and who does not seem to be able to afford to bring home a little snort for himself.

New Elks Lodge Is Proposed For Fredericton

General enthusiasm prevailed at a well attended meeting of applicants to the proposed Elks lodge and club in Fredericton, held at the Barker House last evening when it was announced that upwards of 25 applications had been registered by Grand Organizer P. A. Miquelon of Winnipeg who has spent the past few weeks in the city directing the work of organization. Walter H. Vail presided as chairman and Cedric Cooper as secretary pro-tem.

Encouraging reports were received from committees appointed at last week's meeting and the consensus of opinion was that it would be an easy matter to increase the number of applicants to no less than 50 by the date of the official institution of the lodge which has been tentatively set for Thursday Feb. 4th.

Committees were strengthened to carry on the selective membership campaign up to the date of the meeting and special committees were appointed to make arrangements for hall and banquet. Lodge paraphernalia and dispensation are expected to arrive from Winnipeg within the next few days.

Arrangements are being made by P. A. Miquelon to have officers of St. John Lodge No. 79 present to confer the degree of initiation and it is expected that numerous other visiting members from Saint John and Moncton will also attend the ceremonies. Another informal meeting of applicant's is scheduled for Friday evening at the Barker House to make final arrangements.

NEGOTIATIONS UNDERWAY WITH FRASER COMPANY

Large Pulp and Paper Industry is Planned For Miramichi

Greatly Needed Premier A. A. Dysart States Plans Going Forward

Hon. Dr. A. A. Dysart, Premier of New Brunswick arrived home today from the Upper Provinces where, for several days he has been continuing negotiations with the Fraser Co., Ltd., for the establishment of a large pulp and paper industry on the Miramichi River. Speaking to The Daily Mail, Premier Dysart stated that the whole question of this development has been given serious consideration for some months. While many details yet remain to be developed, the Premier was glad to say that daylight was now breaking through the negotiations and it was hoped in the very near future to be able to make a very definite and encouraging announcement.

Those people on the Miramichi, who have been watching the progress of negotiations with the Fraser Co., will be glad to know that the horizon is clearing and that the wheels of industry will soon drive away the waves of the depression in that locality. The industry recently established by W. J. Scott and his son, Charles Scott, is at the present time helping to relieve the distressed condition on the North Shore. This condition is not the fault of either the present Government or of the Government which preceded it. It is only a part of the general depression which has swept this country for the last few years.

HOSPITAL IS PRESSED FOR QUARTERS

Never in the history of the Victoria Public Hospital has there been a larger number of patients at any one time than is recorded during the present month. At one period during the month of January there were as high as 81 patients confined to the hospital. Today the number registered is 63.

This large number of patients has during the month, taxed the hospital to its utmost capacity, and portions of the hospital which had not previously been used was utilized to handle patients. At one day during the week the applications for admission to the hospital had to wait in a long line in order to register before being assigned their rooms.

Miss A. G. Woodcock, superintendent of the hospital, stated to The Daily Mail today that this month has been the busiest one since she took over the duties of superintendent. It is understood also that there is no record month at the hospital, not even including the time of the flu, which can surpass the month of January of 1937.
