as bacterial infections. He discussed the effects of parasites on cattle and the various methods in which control may be established. In the latter connection, he asserted that the execution of sanitary and hygienic measures on all premises and especially does this apply to the protection of young animals from the time of birth until maturity when they have the necessary protective forces to combat the invasion of parasites. "Community co-operation" was urged by the speaker as the best weapon to use in the struggle against parasites.

Resolutions

The resolutions, presented by F. G. Richard, M.L.A., St. Anne, dealt chiefly with agricultural work in French populated areas. One of the most important resolutions included that requesting the government to appoint a French-speaking assistant to the superintendent of the Illustration Farms in New Brunswick. It was also resolved that a petition be sent to Hon. J. G. Gardiner, Minister of Agriculture at Ottawa, to establish a second experimental farm in this province situated in the northern part of New Brunswick.

Civic Committee
To Meet on Friday

A meeting of the contingencies committee of the city council will be held Friday night to formulate plans regarding the city's observance of Coronation Week. A general meeting of all the societies and organizations in the city will be held next week to discuss measures in connection with the celebration. Friday's session will draw up recommendations to be submitted at the general meeting.

The committee, which is responsible for expenditures under the heading of contingencies, such as in connection with the coronation celebration, has ordered coronation badges to the number of 2,100 for the school children of Fredericton. The badges are being manufactured in England and will be received here within a short time.

Mayor Kitchen recently conferred with Premier Dymally on the matter, and it was learned that the government will take part, probably decorating the governmental buildings. At that time, however, the premier will be in England.

Soon after the coronation, plans will be made also for a visit of Lord Tweedsmuir, governor-general of Canada, when it is likely a public reception will be held in the Legislative Assembly chamber. At that time all governmental officials will have returned to Fredericton.

Favorable Winter on
Game, States Guide

The season has been an easy one on game according to Ken Moir, Penniac guide, who made a cruise of the forest in the Penniac area. Wendall Allen accompanied Mr. Moir on his cruise, and both report deer very plentiful, while signs indicate that fur bearing animals are likewise plentiful.

"I have never seen deer looking so good for this time of the year," declared Mr. Moir, who has been tramping the woods ever since he was 14 years old. "The deer are feeding mostly on moss, although usually the deep winter snows force them to eat fir and balsam."

"The moose mostly are travelling in the open as they do in the summer time, and the partridge seem plentiful, as they wintered well, and there was little crust to bother them."

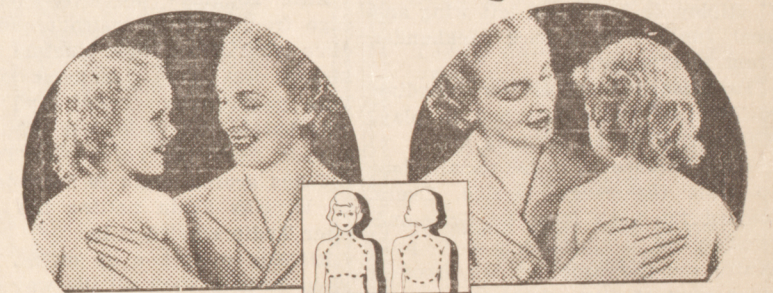
