LOVE IS THE PRICE OF PEACE SAYS SPEAKER

Remembrance Day in Stanley was observed by a parade of the school children to the Institute hall where the people of the village had gathered to keep alive the memory of the boys who fought during the days of the Great War.

The gathering was presided over by Miss Elizabeth Sansom and seated with her on the platform were Rev. J. R. Belyea, Rev. Mr. Campbell, Rev. Mr. Marshall, and Rev. Mr. Blakenay. Mr. Marshall, who had overseas experience, gave the assembled audience an insight into the havoc and awfulness of war as he read a graphic account of an engagement which he had witnessed. This account taken from his personal diary was written at the time of the engagement.

Following are extracts from Mr. Belyea's address, "Discord, destruction, wars and rumors of wars are in our midst, they stalk abroad. My brethren, these things ought not to be. We want peace for we are born to higher things. Let us be honest with ourselves....are we willing to pay the price of peace? Love is the price which peace demands. There are certain virtues which we must cultivate if we are going to have our part in the promotion of peace, righteousness and happiness, purity, truth, trustworthiness, love. The real causes of war are impurity, deceit, distrust, fear, hatred. Millions of our fellow countrymen fought in the great war to end war, yet peace has not been established. The highest tribute you can pay to those whose sacrifices you call to remembrance today is to dedicate yourselves to the promotion of peace, to the building up of your characters as peacemakers, as the children of God.

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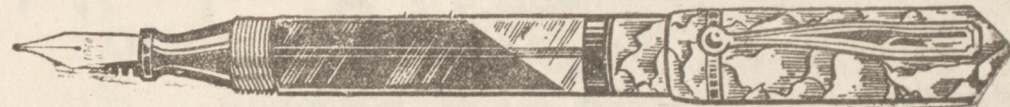
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
