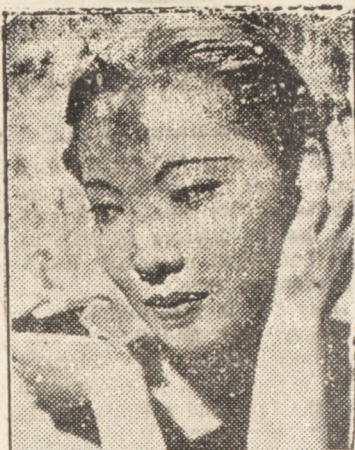

A WILD VIOLET ON THE AIR

CHICAGO, Aug. 13—Betty Ito, Japanese-American radio actress, who made her debut over NBC networks as Sui Wing in Jack Armstrong last October, and who has since been heard in various radio productions, has recently been signed as an NBC contract artist in Chicago and has been assigned to the role of Alice Carter in Young Hickory, NBC dramatic serial of a young doctor's struggles in the Red River Valley Country. Though Miss Ito entered radio by chance when she heard Myrt and Marge were looking for a Japanese girl to play the part of "Yuki" she thought her first NBC network role was that of a Japanese, she is now heard as a modern American girl, inasmuch as she is a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of the University of Chicago and had to feign a Japanese accent to get her first radio role. Listeners cannot differentiate her voice from that of her Caucasian contemporaries.

Miss Ito, whose full American name

is Elizabeth Carol Ito and whose Japanese name is "Sumire," meaning "Wild Violet," is the daughter of Kameo and Tokumatsu Ito, research expert in the department of anthropology at the Marshall Field Museum.

TO CONTINUE AS JELL-O FUNSTER

NEW YORK, Aug. 13—Freddie Lightner, the clown with the streamlined comedy, has made good as guest comedian on the broadcasts starring Jane Froman over the NBC-Red Network on Sundays at 7:00 p.m., EDT. Originally engaged as the first of a series of guest comedians for the Summer program, Freddie's irrepressible humor clicked so effectively that he and his prima donna from Snow-shoe Junction, Me., Rosella McQueen, have been held over week after week. Now this paragon of optimism will be dropping in indefinitely.

A footlight headliner in his own right for ten years in vaudeville and in Broadway, this is Lightner's first big opportunity in radio. Heretofore, his microphone associations have been limited to occasional guest broadcasts on leading NBC variety shows. Admittedly trembling, he marched in where angels—other comedians—feared to tread, and dared take up the comedy assignment dropped by Jack Benny and Mary Livingstone the week radio's top-notch funsters started their vacations.

Born in Greenport, L. I., where he still lives, Freddie Lightner and his sister, Winnie, early took a keen interest in the theater. They participated in amateur shows until Winnie went on the professional stage that led to Hollywood, and Freddie ventured into vaudeville.
