

Detroit Red Wings Even Play-off Series With New York Rangers

Stanley Cup Brigade Whip Gothamites 4-2 To Remain in Play-offs

Defeat Ends Inspired Winning Streak of Patrickmen

DETROIT, April 8—The champion Detroit Red Wings skated back into the Stanley Cup hockey picture to-night, whipping New York Rangers 4-2 to even the best-of-five series at one victory apiece before 13,491 paid customers.

Again the speedy, smooth team that won the National Hockey League championship from Canadiens of Montreal, the Red Wings fired three goals in four and a half minutes past Dave Kerr, sensational New York netminder, in the first period. Kerr had been scored on but twice in 313 minutes of playoff hockey before to-night's game.

The defeat ended the Rangers' inspired winning streak that had given them straight-game victories over Toronto and the Montreal Maroons before they defeated Detroit 5-1 at New York in the final series opener on Thursday.

A high stick penalty on Lynn Patrick midway of the first period started the Red Wings to victory. With the aid of the Rangers' manager in the box Johnny Sorrell got a freak goal with a hard drive from far out on left wing that bounced against Murray Murdoch and trickled into the nets as Herbie Lewis swung wildly at it.

Hustle To Attack

The goal gave the Red Wings the lead for the first time in the series, and they immediately turned on the heat. Modere Bruneteau drove home Syd Howe's rebound at 12:07 and Johnny Gallagher added the third goal at 13:31, skating in for a hard 25-foot drive from left wing.

Lewis, climaxing a beautiful passing rush with Howe and Goodfellow, put Detroit four goals ahead midway of the second period with a sharp angle shot from left wing that found a far corner of the net, and the Red Wings scoring was over.

Detroit was forced to the defence as the Rangers rushed five men down the ice, but the poke-checking and body checking of the Red Wings at the blueline, combined with some brilliant work in the nets by Earl Robinson substituting for the injured Normie Smith, saved the game.

Babe Pratt finally broke the scoring ice for the Rangers at 15:06 of the second period with a 15-foot drive on passes from both Neil and Mac Colville, and Butch Keeline, standing at the corner of the nets, poked the puck between Robertson's skates at 18:18 on Art Coulter's rebound, to

BRITISH TRACK TEAMS MAY COMPETE HERE

MONTREAL, April 9—Tentative plans have been laid for a visit of the Oxford and Cambridge track and field teams this summer. The Province of Quebec Track and Field Association hope to have the famous University squads here for a special meet at Molson Stadium July 23. The contemplated visit will be part of a tour the Britishers plan to make to meet the various Universities of the United States.

They will compete in a dual meet against a team from Princeton and Cornell July 10, and the following week oppose Harvard and Yale in a similar meet. After the Harvard-Yale event the British team plans to enter a meet staged by the Hamilton Olympic Club at Hamilton and another by the Achilles Club at Toronto.

One of the main attractions on the visiting team will be A. G. K. Browne who placed second in the Olympic 400-metre event. Browne, outstanding quarter-miler in Great Britain, recently won his specialty event in the Oxford-Cambridge meet in 48.4 seconds, also taking the 100-yard dash in 10 seconds flat.

The Oxford-Cambridge track team first made an appearance in a Montreal meet in 1901 against a combined McGill and Toronto Varsity team.

Conquer Saint John 48-33 in Initial Battle Hoop Finals

SAINT JOHN, April 9—Led by their chunky Italian-American star, Johnny Ferraro, the McGill Grads took a toe-hold on the Eastern Canada senior basketball semi-finals with a 48-33 victory over the Saint John Seniors in the first of the two-game series last night on High School Court.

The second and deciding game will be played on High floor Saturday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock.

After a wobbly start which saw the Saint John five shove into the lead, the Grads intercepting local players' passes and executing a swift short-passing play soon took the lead and were never headed. Only once did Saint John come within tying the

count and that was in the second half when Ferraro was replaced for a brief space of three minutes. When Ferraro returned to the floor the score read 37 for Grads and 33 for Saint John.

With but five minutes to go to the final whistle Grads put Seniors practically on the defensive and broke through beneath the locals' hoop in attacks which netted them their other 11 points while the Seniors appeared helpless to cope with a defence which bottled them up and took the play from them.

Arrangements to have the powerful French club with such stars in their lineup as big "Babe" Siebert, Walter Buswell, Johnny Gagnon, Paul Haynes, George Mantha, Pit Lepine, Armand Mondou and "Red" Lorrain, were made this evening and once again Monton was hockey conscious as Tuesday's night's contest will mark the only appearance in New Brunswick of the Hart-coached collection.

Opposing the powerful "Flying Frenchmen" will be lined up five members of the famed Monton Hawks who are now pros, Bill Miller, Bill Gill, "Dud" James, Sammy McManus and "Knucker" Irvine, while others who will fill spots in the stars lineup will be Jackie Keating, former Newcastle and Saint John star, now with Providence, and a line mate of Sammy McManus; "Dizzy" Desilets, former Abbie and Saint John star, now with the Canucks as well as Bill McKenzie, George Brown, Albert LeDuc of Canadiens and either Wilf Cude, their smart goaler or Hughie McCormick, crack New Haven janitor.

SUDBURY WINS FIRST BATTLE OF ALLAN CUP FINALS

CALGARY, April 8—Sudbury Tigers featured a baffling change of pace to trounce North Battleford Beavers 4-1 here tonight in the first game of the best-of-five Allan Cup finals.

Bewildering the North Battleford defence as they mixed up blazing drives from the blueline with short-passing sorties that finished in front of the goalmouth, the classy Eastern Canada champions scored the only goal of the first period, added three more in the second and laid down a tight defence in the third to coast to victory.

Close to 5,000 fans watching the first Canadian senior final contest ever played in Calgary saw the great Sudbury machine allow only one goal to a hockey outfit noted for high scoring. That tally came at the three-quarter mark of the third period from the stick of Joe Schwab, Beaver utility man.

Speedy Jules Cholette opened the scoring with a scorching drive from the blueline in the first period. Then in the second session Tigers' drive really got going and Hill, Hastie and Cholette pumped in goals.

North Battleford sent every man up the ice but their goaler in a hectic third period, but Schwab's shot on Burke's rebound was the best they could do.

"You were great, kid," he said. Goal-keepers Johnny Sorrell, Mud Bruneteau, Johnny Gallagher and Herbie Lewis, posed for the pictures grouped and singly, chewing on oranges and puffing cigarettes.

Owner James Norris, jr., with visions of a second successive Stanley Cup, bustled wide-eyed into dressing room, made straight for the orange bowl and beamed at his warriors.

"We got 'em now," he said. "Nice going boys."

In the New York Rangers room, Lester Patrick voiced fears Ott Heller, Kitchener defenceman, and rookie Alex Shibicky had suffered slight head concussions.

"We'll take them to hospital in the morning to make sure, anyway," he said.

Shibicky went off in a dazed condition at the start of the second period after being dropped with a terrific body check by big Bucko McDonald.

Heller fell to the ice after being struck accidentally with a stick with eight minutes of play remaining.

"They pounded hell out of us," Butch Keeling said. "They were better than we were tonight."

"We'll get 'em," handsome Lynn Patrick yelled across to Butch. Smiling Ching Johnson, finishing up 20 years at the blueline, said nothing, but gurgled over a bottle of beer.

"They got the breaks," the silver haired Patrick said, "but we're still hot and it's going to be a tough series."

Montreal Boys Form the Most Transported "Brother Act" in History of Game --- Desse With 19th Team, Earl With 17th.

MONTREAL, April 9—Hockey to Desse and Earl Roche has been a continuous travelogue. They are home from the wars again.

Desse played with St. Louis Flyers this past season. He reached the last round-up for the American Association championship. The Flyers were winged by the Millers of Minneapolis in an upset finale.

St. Louis was Desse Roche's 12th stop on his professional travels, the dozzenth club from which he has drawn a pay cheque.

Earl was with Cleveland in the International-Canam hook-up, his 10th professional club. The Falcons did not do so well.

It is very doubtful if there ever was a hockey player who changed colors as often as either of the Roche boys. This season was the first in which they didn't play as teammates in at least one game.

Altogether, Desse Roche has played with 19 different hockey teams, amateur and pro. Earl has played with 17.

Both figure their careers have a long way to run, and still have new fields to conquer.

Desse is the older of the brothers Roche, though most everybody thinks it's the other way about.

They started at St. Leo's Academy, played as juniors with Vics, as intermediates with St. Anthony's and Martin, as seniors with M.A.A.A., Allan Cup champions.

They played commercial hockey with Bell Telephone and Mount Royal Hotel teams.

Both turned professional with Maroons in the 1930-31 season, then their travels began.

Desse has played with Maroons, Windsor, Boston, Ottawa, Canadiens, St. Louis Eagles, Buffalo, Detroit Red Wings and Olympics, Pittsburgh, Cleveland and St. Louis Flyers.
