Dick Foran is the screen's favorite singing cowboy. Right now, he's on the threshold of a career in radio as the cowhand foil for Gracie, of the Allens. But the closest Dick ever came to a range was Flemington, N. J.—3,000 miles away from the nearest alfalfa country.

The dude broncho-buster, who enters radio Monday night, April 12, as featured singer of the new Burns and Allen WEAF-NBC series, comes from a long line of blue-blooded Easterners. His father is Senator Arthur F. Foran of New Jersey. It was on the Senator's well-tended Flemington pastures that Dick learned all about riding on a Shetland pony.

Like his father, Dick entered Princeton to study geology. Unlike his father, he didn't graduate. He stayed only long enough to be the star of the Triangle Club's musical show of 1931. After that he left, but somebody had removed the family welcome mat and Dick kept on going until he reached New York.

He auditioned for radio and got a job as singer on the "Farm and Home Hour." That lasted six months. Then he got an "all-is-forgiven" wire from home and he became a prodigal son again.

He went on a business trip as far as Hollywood where he had three screen tests. Back in Jersey, he found three wires asking him to come back for a movie contract. George Burns heard him do a little impromptu singing at the "Famous Door"—Hollywood's famous swing club—and offered him his radio role.

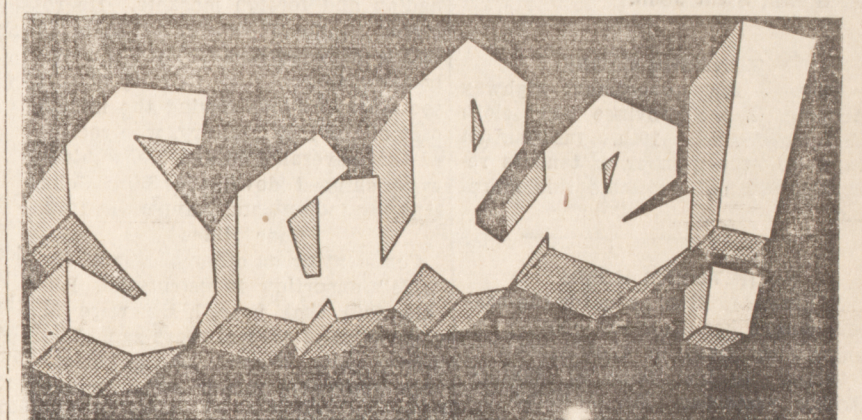
