

Forgotten Man Writes Another Chapter in the 'Carl Hubbell' Baseball Legend

Coffman Fans Batter To Give Carl 23rd Win

NEW YORK, May 24—A forgotten man came out of a bullpen today to write another brilliant chapter in the baseball legend that is Carl Owen Hubbell.

As the great master trudged to the showers his team one run ahead but the bases loaded with two out in the ninth inning, Dick Coffman, an insignificant Giant bench warmer, rushed to the mound, struck out John Dickshot and gave Hubbell his 23rd straight National League victory, a 4-3 triumph over Pittsburgh Pirates in Pittsburgh.

As the master cracked to allow singles by "Pep" Young and "Woody" Jensen to give the Pirates runners on first and third, Hubbell was taken out. Cliff Melton rushed in to stem the tide, walked the dangerous Paul Waner, and he, too, was sent to the showers in favor of Coffman.

It was Hubbell's narrowest escape after his long string that began on Forbes Field, Pittsburgh, July 17, 1936 with a 3-2 conquest of the Pirates. Today's victory was his seventh of the season.

Putting together three singles for the winning run in the second inning, Brooklyn Dodgers capitalized on a

six-hit pitching job by big Max Butcher for a 1-0 shutout of the Reds in Cincinnati.

Butcher, in hanging up his second victory of the season, scattered the Reds' hits through as many innings. He gave up only one base on balls and struck out three.

Yanks Take Lead

NEW YORK, May 24 — Continuing their 1936 style slugging, the Yankees won their fourth straight victory here today as Spurgeon Chandler pitched his second shutout and Cleveland Indians were routed 14-0.

The triumph with the Athletics defeated by the Browns, lifted the New Yorkers into first place by the margin of a full game.

The fourth was the winners' big inning when they scored eight runs on nine hits, six of them in succession. Lou Gehrig, big gun of the afternoon with three singles and a double, bagged two of his singles in that merry-go-round, which drove Ivy Paul Andrews to cover.

Lusty Red Sox batting, led by Jimmy Foss with a homer and two doubles, enabled "Rube" Walberg to defeat Chicago White Sox 9-5 in Boston.

BASEBALL'S BIG SIX

Buddy Hassett's two singles in three trips to the plate against Cincinnati Reds yesterday brought the Dodgers' fancy fielding first baseman into third place among the National League's leading batters. In the American League, where the top two positions remained unchanged, as did those in the National, the Browns' Beau Bell displayed Lyn Lary of the Indians as third man.

BRINGS FISTIC DISPUTE TO COURT

NEW YORK, May 24—Courageously carrying the issue right down to the Circuit Court of Appeals in Philadelphia this week, Madison Square Garden is playing the proverbial dead-man's hand today in its imputed but now thoroughly understood proposal to stop the Braddock-Louis heavyweight championship fight in Chicago. The Garden, I might add, is very courageous about this. It might even win—and wouldn't that be a terrible thing?

With the all-but-abandoned Schmeling-Braddock fight here only 10 days away, a victory in Philadelphia would represent the most abject of disasters. It would mean that the Garden had unwillingly won, whereas all it is hoping to do right now is make certain that Chicago, notably Promoter Mike Jacobs, loses. In other words, the last thing it hopes to do is obtain Schmeling and Braddock; all it hopes to do is stymie Jacobs in Chicago with Braddock and Louis.

If it doesn't Jacobs will wind up the summer with all the leading heavyweights under his control. If it does, I would say, offhand, that we'll wind up the summer without a leading heavyweight fight of any kind. The Garden, without a lien on anybody after Braddock officially makes good his escape, will go out of the heavyweight promotion business altogether rather than let another man finish with the field in his pocket.

Probably it doesn't sound important. Possibly it isn't, what with President John R. Kilpatrick off on a 10 days' fishing trip. But the one thing John doesn't want to catch right now is James J. Braddock. As a matter of fact, he'd rather catch diphtheria.

For once the Braddock obligation is discharged, boxing at Madison Square Garden won't have anything except the usual deficit.

Favorites Advance in British Golf Tourney

SANDWICH, Eng., May 24—The spotlight swung on the spectacular exploits of Arthur D'Arcy Locke, 19 year old South African phenomenon, as the first round of the British amateur golf championship was contested here today.

Locke, picked in advance as a probable finalist for the crown relinquished by Scot Hector Thomson due to ill health, burned up the Royal St. George's layout to defeat C. C. Trautner of Silver Spring, Md., 7 and 5.

The young South African, holder of the amateur and open titles of his native Dominion, went out in 33 to turn seven up. Trautner could not face that kind of sharpshooting and used up 59 strokes on the first nine holes.

Most of the British favorites advanced easily into the next round although there was some eyebrow lifting over the defeat of Francis Francis by the veteran E. B. Tipping at the 19th hole, and of Leonard Crawley, former Walker cup player, by Jocelyn Walker, one up.

Cyril Tolley, long-hitting Englishman who held the title in 1920 and 1929, ousted J. F. MacDonnell, 4 and 3 and Dr. William Tweddell, champion in 1927 and finalist against Lawson Little in 1935 beat Harry Bentley, 3 and 2.

Cecil Ewing, Gordon Peters and Alec Hill, all members of the last British Walker cup team, turned in opening round victories. Hon. Michael Scott, surprise, winner of the championship in 1933, overcame S. W. Jacobs, 2 up, and Frank Pennick, current English titleholder, downed the veteran John Beck, 4 and 3. Lister Hartley, former Walker cup star, eliminated Fredi Gutmann of Berlin 5 and 4.

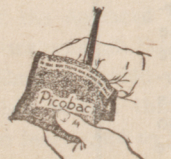
"I'm a peaceful man," repeated he. "I try to be a good neighbour, same as President Roosevelt does ... and Mr. Baldwin. But ..."
