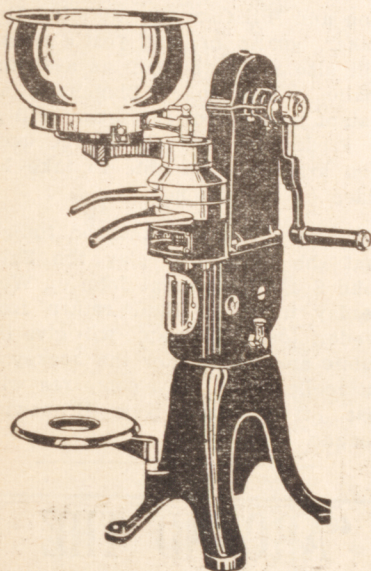

### New Antarctic

previously explored by another Norwegian, Captain Riiser-Larsen. Its coast line is some 1,400 miles from the South Pole whereas Little America is only 800.

Antarctic lands have been claimed for the United States, Great Britain, New Zealand, France and Norway. Of settlement in these remote regions there has been little possibility up to this time although Byrd's base, offering shelter for regular visits, still exists in Little America. In 1924 Secretary Hughes expressed the opinion that "the discovery of lands unknown to civilization, even when coupled with a formal taking of possession, does not support a valid claim of sovereignty unless the discovery is followed by an actual settlement of the discovered country."

Settlement has many more problems in the Antarctic lands separated by vast expanses of sea from the older settled continents than in the Arctic where the land masses are closer together. Aided by the airplane and the radio, Arctic and sub-Arctic settlement has made considerable progress in recent years, the Russians holding the lead as is natural. But Antarctic regions hold natural treasures of coal and possibly oil, and many other commodities of which the world may some day stand in sore need.

In the game Mr. Jordan is playing with a Christchurch, N. Z., man it takes three months for one move each or four complete moves a year. In four years Jordan has made six moves.

But the modern idea of speed and more speed is creeping in. In another match with a competitor in Drustie, Latvia, 14 moves have been made in seven months. The largest number of games Jordan has played at one time was 83, and he figures he has spent \$1,500 in postage.

He has played 'over the board' in Belgium, France, England and other countries. In 1925 in London he defeated Moroz, Czechoslovakian champion, one of the four times that noted player was beaten in the 500 games he played on tour.

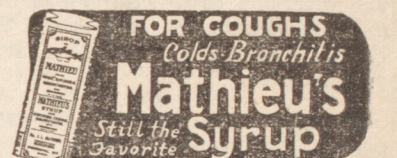
