Cecil Coveney Met With Accident at **Hockey Practice**

Cecil Coveney, star forward with U. N. B.'s Intercollegiate squad, suffered severe head and facial injuries when he collided with Miles MacGibbon a teammate at a practice session yesterday afternoon. Both boys met "head-on," and Coveney was knocked unconscious by the impact, his head striking the icy surface. He was still unconscious when the ambulance rushed him to the Victoria Public Hospital.

Attending physicians announced this morning that Coveney suffered a cracked cheek bone, and is suffering from concussions and a possible skull fracture. Coveney is one of the best athletes in the province. He participates in boxing, hockey, baseball, tennis and basketball and beyond a doubt is U.N.B.'s best "all around" athlete.

"Cece" is popular with his team mates and with the sporting public in general. His loss to the Collegians for the season will be a severe blow to the aspirations of U.N.B.'s hockey team.
