## Father Sharkey Speaks On China At St. Dunstan's Hall

An appreciative audience heard a most interesting lecture given last evening at St. Dunstan's Hall by Rev. Father Sharkey who is in charge of the Catholic Chinese Missions at Vancouver. Father Sharkey is a native of Saint John and was ordained in 1929. Shortly afterwards he was sent to China by his Bishop where he spent three years in successful work among the Chinese pagans, and on being recalled to Canada was placed in charge of the mission at Vancouver. The speaker described conditions in China where much poverty exists in the innermost sections of the country which has a population of five million people and where but few know God and the consolations of the Christian faith. He spoke highly of the Chinese who were artistic and have respect for family life and discipline and are religious at heart but the vast majority of them do not possess a true religion which brings about the love of God but have rather a religion of fear of their false gods. China boasts the finest civilization the world has ever known but her religion consists of warding off the ire of the bad gods. One amusing example of this was given to show the meaning of the Chinese religion by the building of a brick wall in front of their homes in many cases to prevent the devil from coming in and deviating a straight course which is the only one that the devil of the Chinese mentality can pursue. The speaker showed how vast the opportunity and the duty of the Christian people was to share with their brotherman irrespective of color the gift of faith and it was our duty to help as much as we can.

The Chinese Mission in Vancouver was established in 1933. At that time there was not one Christian in the Chinese section. There are now over a hundred and twenty-five Chinese adult Christians and schools have been established for boys and girls as well as a kindergarten.

The speaker also dwelt on the great poverty and commented on the policy of the Governments of some countries which destroyed cattle to raise the price of beef when there was so much hunger in other lands.

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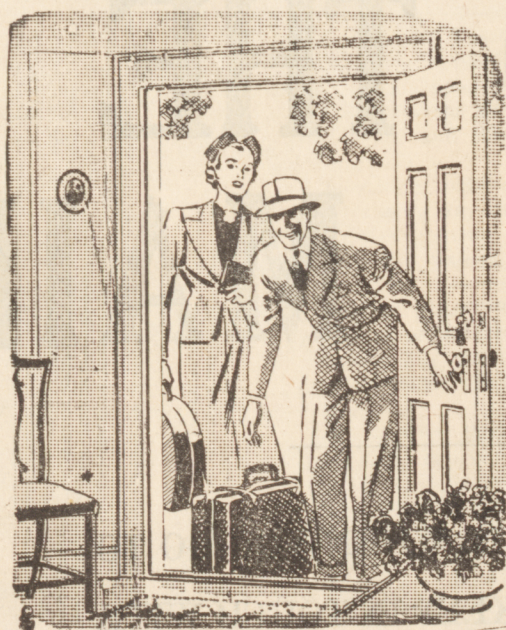
