Sir Charles was graduated from the University of Toronto in 1888 and for a year was professor of chemistry of Ottawa, who have been visiting Linas who for several days was his and geology at Central University, Kentucky. In 1903, after his sensational success with Marquis wheat. Sir Charles became Canada's prst Dominion cerealist. His work for the Canadian agriculturist consisted in painstaking sorting of countless varities of seeds. He later originated Garnet wheat, a strain more suited to the northern prairies, and it was developed by his successor, L. H. Newman.

Marquis was first obtained by Dr A. P. Saunders, in 1892 but was neither examined nor developed until Dr. Charles set to work in 1903.

Sir Charles served his country for 22 years and ill-health forced him to retire at the age of 58 on a modest pension. Later a grateful government voted him an annual grant of \$5,000 for life and in 1934 the King recognized his service to Canada and the Empire by making him a knight bachelor.

He married Mary Blackwell of Toronto in 1892. After his retirement from the government service they moved from Ottawa to Toronto.
