PROPOSE TRANSFER COMPENSATION BOARD HEADQUARTERS TO CAPITAL ACCORDING TO UNOFFICIAL REPORT

G. M. Byron Honored by Rumored Hon. Dr. Roberts Will Control Organization

Officials Silent

Active in Political Life Change Will Not Effect Present Executive --Report Reliable

> According to an unofficial report learned this morning, the seat of operations of the New Brunswick Workmen's Compensation Board will be transferred to Fredericton. The report further stated that Hon. W. F. Roberts, Provincial Minister of Health and Labor, will assume control of the organization. Although the report could not be officially confirmed, it was received from a reliable source and is believed to be auth

The proposed move of the government is in keeping with its policy of centralizing all departments in the Capital City. The latest proposal is a "followup" on the recent action of the government in connection with a change in the personnel of the board's executive at the present headquarters in Saint John. As a result of governmental action, R. A. Irving was appointed as head of the board in place of John A. Sinclair, former chairman of the body, who was superannuated.

Officials at government headquarters would neither confirm or deny the current report, and would not make any comment regarding the proposed plan. It is understood that Dr. Roberts will act as ministerial head of the board in conjunction with Mr. Irving, who will be in charge of the routine operations of the organization. So far as could be learned no additional changes are contemplated regarding the "set-up" of the Board.
