## KING'S PRINTER VETERAN MEMBER OF ELKS LODGE

G. M. Byron Honored by  
Fredericton Group --  
Exalted Ruler

### Grand Lodge Member

Active in Political Life  
of Province--Well  
Known Here

Recently elected to the office of Honorary Past Exalted Ruler of newly formed Elks Lodge in this city, George M. Byron, King's Printer for the Province of New Brunswick, is one of the older members of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks on the continent. Well known in Elk circles throughout the North American continent, Mr. Byron's re-

cent appointment was made in recognition of his services rendered the Order.

Mr. Byron, one of the most colorful figures in governmental circles in the province, first joined the Order in 1888 as a charter member of the lodge at Hoboken, New Jersey. He is the last surviving charter member of that group. In 1891 he was appointed to the Grand Lodge and attended the conference held in Louisville, Kentucky. Since that time he has attended several grand lodge sessions and has been honored by various groups in the world-wide organization.

His affability and pleasant personality makes him instantaneously popular with all with whom he comes in contact, and he is well known by legion of friends throughout the continent. In his earlier years the esteemed gentleman was actively affiliated with the political activities in the province and has held several responsible positions for both governmental parties. During his years as a resident in United States, Mr. Byron was also engaged in political work and was an associate of many figures who later rose to prominence in the political life of the republic.

During the past 49 years, Mr. Byron has always maintained an active interest in the welfare of the Elks organization and was one of the men responsible for the growth of the order in Canada. His latest appointment on the executive of the local lodge was a fitting tribute to his splendid work.

## PROPOSE TRANSFER COMPENSATION BOARD HEADQUARTERS TO CAPITAL ACCORDING TO UNOFFICIAL REPORT

Rumored Hon. Dr. Roberts  
Will Control  
Organization

### Officials Silent

Change Will Not Effect  
Present Executive --  
Report Reliable

According to an unofficial report learned this morning, the seat of operations of the New Brunswick Workmen's Compensation Board will be transferred to Fredericton. The report further stated that Hon. W. F. Roberts, Provincial Minister of Health and Labor, will assume control of the organization. Although the report could not be officially confirmed, it was received from a reliable source and is believed to be authentic.

The proposed move of the government is in keeping with its policy of centralizing all departments in the Capital City. The latest proposal is a "followup" on the recent action of the government in connection with a change in the personnel of the board's executive at the present headquarters in Saint John. As a result of governmental action, R. A. Irving was appointed as head of the board in place of John A. Sinclair, former chairman of the body, who was superannuated.

Officials at government headquarters would neither confirm or deny the current report, and would not make any comment regarding the proposed plan. It is understood that Dr. Roberts will act as ministerial head of the board in conjunction with Mr. Irving, who will be in charge of the routine operations of the organization. So far as could be learned no additional changes are contemplated regarding the "set-up" of the Board.

### School Inspectors Conference Closes

The various phases of school problems were discussed at the annual meeting of the School Inspectors of the Province, which closed here yesterday. Dr. A. S. MacFarlane, Chief Superintendent of Education, presented each inspector with a short course of instructions, as used in the various schools of the province, so they might study them and offer suggestions to Dr. MacFarlane, in order to improve teaching methods. The inspectors checked over the various mistakes made by teachers in their return sheets, and will instruct the different teachers, in their respective districts, as to the correct form to follow in making out their returns. Efforts will be made to collect delinquent taxes, so that the teachers will receive their salaries as per contract.

## HEAVY DOCKET COMING SESSION APPEAL COURT

Ten cases are included on the February docket of the appeals division of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick which convenes here Tuesday. Chief Justice J. B. M. Baxter and Justices Grimmer and Fairweather will preside.

F. Dodd Tweedie, Edmundston, for the plaintiff, will support an appeal from the Madawaska county court in the matter of Lionel Couillard vs. the Provincial Bank of Canada and others, contending that the trial judge was in error in holding the sale of an automobile by Raymond Devost, whose assignment was cancelled, to the appellant did not pass the title of the car to Couillard, and that the car was liable to seizure on the execution of the bank.

J. J. F. Winslow, K.C., Fredericton for the defendant McGuire and C. L. Dougherty for the defendant Mooers, will move to set aside a verdict for the plaintiff and to enter a verdict for the defendants in the appeal of Arthur Billings vs. McGuire and Wilmot Mooers. The plaintiff was awarded \$1,732 costs before Chief Justice Barry at the York nisi prius sittings on Oct. 21 and 22 last. The defendant McGuire, it was said, was driving a reaper drawn by horses at Quigg Brook, near Hainesville, on Sept. 17, 1935, when a collision occurred with a car driven by Billings. Billings lost an eye as the result of the accident.

John E. Friel, Moncton, for the plaintiff will move for a new trial in the matter of Joseph Fournier vs. Brown-Holder Biscuit Co., Ltd. The action was brought against the defendant alleging negligence in the operation of a truck by the servant of the company when, on Oct. 23, the plaintiff allegedly was struck near the intersection of Pottford street and Mountain Road in Moncton at 8 p.m. and was knocked unconscious.
