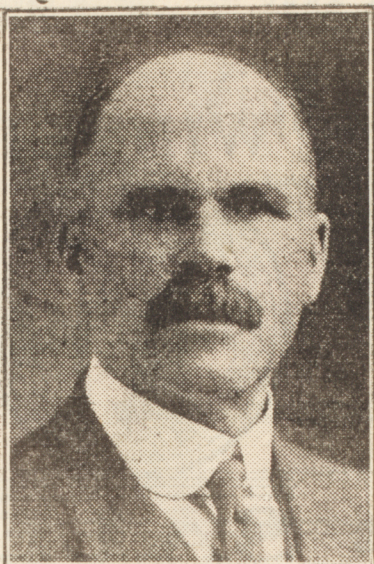

Each tender must be accompanied by a certified cheque on a chartered bank in Canada, payable to the order of the Honourable the Minister of Public Works, equal to 10 per cent. of the amount of the tender, or Bonds of the Dominion of Canada or of the Canadian National Railway Company and its constituent companies, unconditionally guaranteed as to principal and interest by the Dominion of Canada, or the aforementioned bonds and a certified cheque if required to make up an odd amount.

NOTE: The Department, through the Chief Architect's office, will supply blue-prints and specification of the work on deposit of a sum of \$15.00, in the form of a certified bank cheque payable to the order of the Minister of Public Works. The deposit will be released on return of the blue-prints and specification within a month from the date of reception of tenders. If not returned within that period the deposit will be forfeited.

The Cathedral Men's Club

Brick through the ages was the educational talk at the regular meeting of the Men's Club on Tuesday evening, F. S. Mundie of Fredericton outlined the age old history of brick which has shown it to be one of the most enduring of building materials used by man. The bricks made with chopped straw as a binder which are mentioned in the Bible were sun dried brick but the burning of brick was well known to the ancient people of the east. The brick used in the construction of the Tower of Babel were burned brick. King Nebuchadnezzar had all the bricks made in his reign stamped with his ensign and modern researches in the east have shown these and some of even earlier years to be well preserved today.

The early Greeks and Romans are supposed to have learned brick making from the eastern people. The Romans introduced the use of brick into Britain and made and used them freely. After their departure the making of brick became a lost art in Britain for centuries to be revived again by Henry VI. Some of the buildings of Eton erected in 1452 being the oldest of brick construction in England. From England the making and use of brick has been introduced into every land reached by English people.

The speaker then told of the development of brick making in Fredericton. About a century ago there was a brick yard near the site of the present Experimental Station which was operated by a Mr. Simonds. The head brickmaker in this yard was a Mr. Ryan, ancestor of the present owner of Ryan's brickyard, so the family has had a long association with the art. The origin and nature of the clay bed from which the material is obtained was described and a sample shown. Members of the club were surprised to note that it was blue green in color instead of red. Red clay is mixed with the blue to produce the cherry red burned brick of commerce. Mention was made of the fossil trees and fish sometimes found in the clay bed and of the processes of grinding, mixing, moulding, breaking and burning which change the clay to one of the most enduring of building materials. In conclusion the speaker invited the members of the club to visit one of the oldest industrial plants in Fredericton which sends its products all over the Maritime provinces and the eastern United States, to see for themselves how bricks are made.

The thanks of the club were extended to the speaker for his most interesting and instructive address on a subject of common interest to all. The singing directed by the music committee was more than usually interesting and steps were taken to secure song books for use at future meetings.

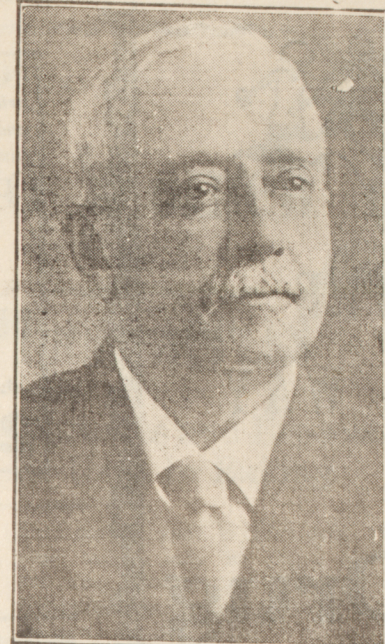

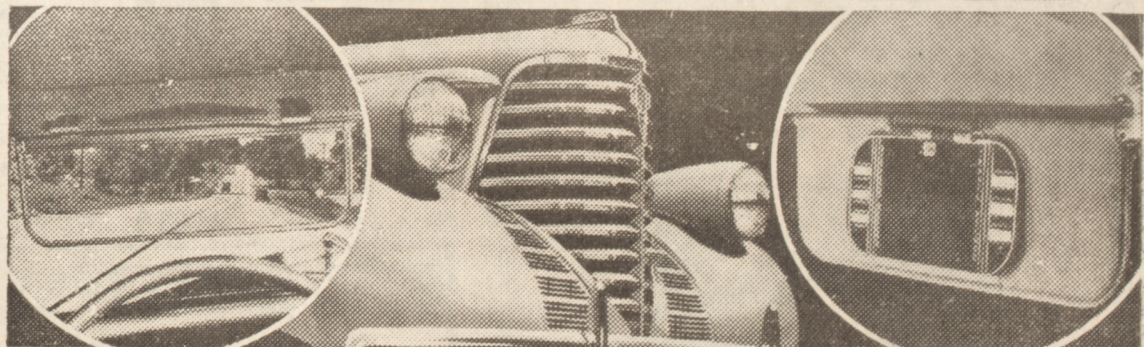
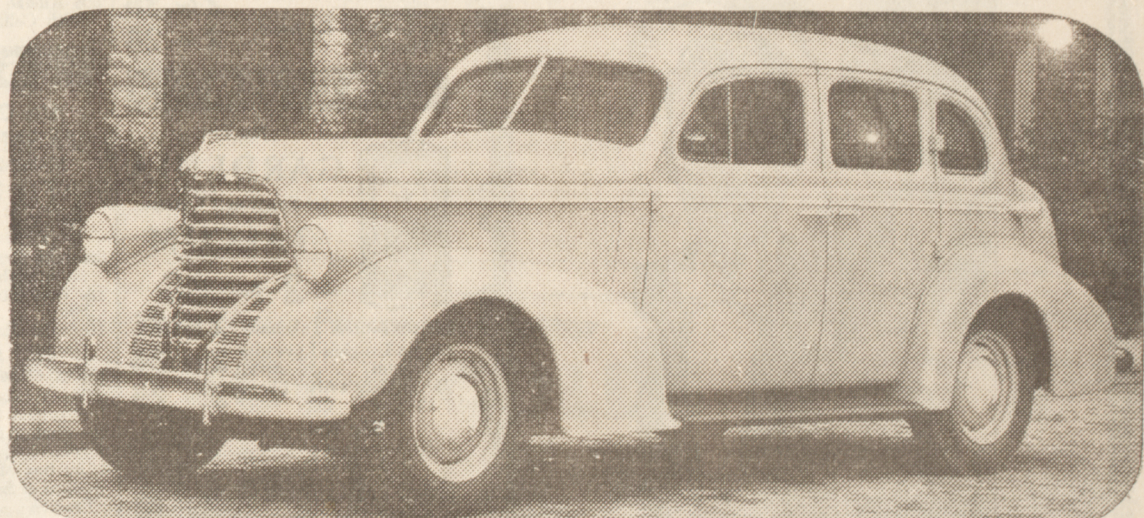
