## **On Education Matters**

Mental Hygiene Work in N.B.

Urging the need of a more enlightened public opinion on educational matters in New Brunswick, Mrs. A. R. Menzies, local delegate to the conof Home and School Association, deas being mainly " concerned with the awakening of parent interest and parent enthusiasm toward the exploring of our educational system." Her report of the conference, which was submitted at a meeting of the local association last evening, gave a detailed outline of the work accomplished at the national meeting and was heard with keen interest by a large number in the audience.

Mrs. Menzies referred to the varous phases of educational work, describing them as "spiritual, moral, physical and mental." She dealt with each of the points and their relation to education.

There is a definite relationship between physical health and mental progress, the speaker said, pointing out that the correction of physical defects in a child might be the first step in improving the school work of the respective pupil. The mental unhealthiness of thousands of school pupils in this province demands the attention of every citizen, Mrs. Menzies continued, declaring that education in mental hygiene is a vital problem.

Pays Tribute In conection with mental education, the speaker paid high tribute to the provincial government and various fraternal and social organizations for their efforts in making progressive steps to cope with the situation.

Continuing her report, Mrs. Menzies lealt with the present programme of Adult Education which is being sponsored by various educational institutions throughout the continent. She quoted W. J. Dunlop, president of the Canadian Association for Adult Education who, in discussing the new in education, stated that "Adult Education is the key to a true democracy and a progressive nation. It is the fundamental of this great educational program known throughout the world as the "Home and School Movement."
