

LEAFS, CANUCKS, MAROONS, AMERKS WIN

CANADIENS NOSE N. Y. RANGERS 2-1; LEAFS BLANK MONTREAL MAROONS 4-0; WISEMAN STARS, AMERKS TRIM HAWKS

Red Lorrain Breaks 1-1 Deadlock in Third Period To Win For Canadiens; Beveridge In Top Form In Maroon Nets; Two Scraps Enliven Game

MONTREAL, Nov. 28—Montreal Canadiens ran their undefeated streak to three games last night, outskating New York Rangers for a 2 to 1 victory in the first N.H.L. meeting of the clubs this season.

Speedy Red Lorrain, backhanded home a goal midway through the 3rd period to break a 1-1 deadlock and keep the French club in third place in the League's Canadian Section—a point behind New York Americans. Rangers' positions as second place holders in the United States Division was unchanged. Close to 7,000 saw Joe Cooper shoot the New Yorkers into the lead early in the first period after a passing play with Clint Smith and Bobbie Kirk. Eight minutes later little Aurel Joliat, back in action after more than a week's layoff, fed Johnny Gagnon a pass for the equalized.

Canadiens pressed hard for the winning counter in the second session but Goalie Davie Kerr was in top form and the score was still tied when the teams came out for the final 20 minutes.

The break came when Mac Colville was chased for bumping Geo. Brown. Canadiens immediately sent four forwards on the attack and the game was decided on the first play when George Mantha whipped a fast pass from his wing to Lorrain. The puck was in the net before Kerr could move.

Leafs Blank Maroons

TORONTO, Nov. 29—A week's rest from the N.H.L. wars faced Toronto Maple Leafs today as the Canadian Section leaders surveyed the pack after an easy 4 to 0 victory over the Section's cellar dwellers, Montreal Maroons.

King Clancy came home with his Maroons Saturday night for the first time this season — and 12,000 fans were disappointed by the Montrealers' showing. Leafs seldom were in danger after Red Horner, the bad man turned good, potted a first period goal.

Only Pudgy Bill Beveridge saved Maroons from a more severe whitewashing. The Maroon goalie was brilliant as the Leafs stormed atop of hickies out a half dozen shots that could easily have been goals.

Two fist fights enlivened proceedings briefly. Boll and Allan Shields drew majors for one outburst but Pep Kelly and Jerry Shannon got away with minors for scuffling in the third. In all there were eight penalties, but there wasn't a goal scored while Leafs had the extra manpower.

Smother Black Hawks

NEW YORK, Nov. 28—New York Americans defeated Chicago Black Hawks 4-0 Saturday night in a speedy National Hockey League match played before 11,000 spectators.

Eddie Wiseman, peppery, little wing player from Newcastle, N. B., hammered home the first New York counter early in the first period. The visitors then opened offensively and in the second frame this gave the New Yorkers a chance to break away and increase their lead. Lorne Carr scoring with the assistance of Art Chapman and Dave Schriener.

Wiseman notched his second tally of the game in the third period with the aid of Nels Stewart and Tommy Anderson, and Schriener scored following a sparkling individual rush which trapped the Chicagoans in the New York end of the rink.

By their victory the Americans held their second place position in the Canadian Section standing while the Hawks remained in third place in the United States Division.

Young Bob Pastor maintains with never a show of actual boasting that only four heavyweights stand between himself and the championship of the world. It is the quiet, unassuming way in which he tells you this, which impresses you.

"Simple matter of the road being blocked a little," he said recently as he sat in a big leather chair in Jimmy Johnston's office in the Paramount Building.

"There might be just only two, Schmeling and Louis, but no matter I'll brush them all aside when the time comes. My only fear now is that Max Schmeling will beat me to Louis and I might not get a chance at the title. If it is a matter between Louis and myself, I'll surely beat him."

"I would have knocked Louis out if they had only let me go in the last fight. I had the tears running down from the outside corners of

his eyes from my left jab. Every time I stabbed him he seemed to get more discouraged. If you feint first he won't feint back. He gets puzzled. He was powerful in the first three or four rounds, but after that, I handled him like a lightweight."

LOUIS EASY IN CLINCHES

"I felt him getting weaker all the time, just from missing. He can't do a thing in the clinches. He tried to pivot me around so as to get a left hook shot at me, but I always had him checked. I am the only fighter who ever hit him a good shot in the stomach and he didn't like it. He grabbed me quick. He can't get away from a straight right or left. I'm positive that I can beat any living man and, held back like I was in the Louis fight, if it had gone 15 rounds I'd have knocked him out anyway."

"I rate the topnotchers as Schmeling, Louis and Farr. They stand in my way. Out they go. One a week!"

SEVERAL SHIFTS IN MINOR LOOP CHAIN OF YANKS

Annual Meeting Of Minor League Starts On Wednesday

NEW YORK, Nov. 29—Advance moves by major and minor league ball clubs today indicate that all records for trades, purchases and general shifting of players and franchises will be broken at the minor and major league meetings scheduled respectively, for Milwaukee, Dec. 1-3, and Chicago Dec. 6-8.

The world champion Yankees have no major deals in view but there will be a general shakeup in their minor league chain and probably a new alignment of clubs with which they will make one-year working agreements.

For that reason Col. Jake Ruppert is going to attend the meetings with 27 managers, business managers, scouts and secretaries, and the colonel will pick up a \$10,000 tab for their expenses.

Minor Shakeup

From the Yankee front office it was learned today that there will be at least three changes in their minor league chain management. There will be a new manager at Akron and Benny Bengough, the old Yankee catcher, who last year managed Joplin, will be promoted to a more important post.

Bill Skiff, who managed Binghamton last year, will have one of the nice jobs in baseball. He will be what might be called a national advisory coach. He will spend the summer visiting all the clubs which the Yanks own, or with whom they have working agreements, getting rid of the deadwood, coaching where needed and tabbing future prospects for promotion.

Col. Ruppert, Ed Barrow and the director of his minor chain, George Weiss, have already been swamped with requests for jobs, and the number of baseball leaders attending the Milwaukee meetings will be exceeded by those hunting jobs.

Joe McCarthy, manager of Yanks, and Scouts Paul Kritchell, Gene McCann, Johnny Nee, Bill Essick, Joe Devine and Bob Coltrin will round out the colonel's major board of strategy.

THREE COUNTERS BY NELS STUART STAVE OFF DEFEAT FOR AMERICANS BY TIEING 3-3 WITH BOSTON BRUINS

Maroons Recuparate From Saturday Night's Defeat at Hands of Leafs to Trample Red Wings 3-1; 6th Defeat Out Of 9 Starts for Champs

BOSTON, Nov. 28—Old Nels Stewart turned the hat trick for New York Americans tonight, and his three goals gave the Amerks a 3-3 tie with the Boston Bruins in a National Hockey League overtime game.

Before a crowd of 12,000 the veteran centre whipped in all the Americans' goals in less than seven minutes during the second period. He wiped out the Bruins' 2-0 and 3-2 leads.

Milt Schmidt opened the Boston scoring during the last minute of the first period and Leroy Goldworthy and Charley Sands accounted for the Bruins' other scores, made during the second frame

Dempsey Contracts Ptomaine Poisoning While In Upper Canada

NEW YORK, Nov. 28—Jack Dempsey, taken ill while on a wrestling refereeing trip in Canada, arrived in New York Saturday night. His ailment, thought originally to be appendicitis, was diagnosed as ptomaine poisoning.

The former heavyweight champion got off the train at Yonkers, 20 miles from New York, and drove into the city with his wife and two friends. Train attaches said he walked around during the trip, apparently in no great discomfort although he kept an ice bag on his abdomen.

He went immediately to his apartment for an examination by his physician.

The Bruins, starting without the injured Ray Beattie, played the last 20 minutes without Red Beattie, who suffered a skate cut on his leg halfway through the third frame.

It was the Bruins' eighth game without a setback and by splitting the points, they piled up 14 out of a possible 16.

Maroons Down Champs

DETROIT, Nov. 28—The Champion Detroit Red Wings, still in the throes of a slump, absorbed a 3-1 lacing tonight from the Montreal Maroons. The win gave Maroons a split on their weekend play, for they lost 4-0 last night to Toronto Maple Leafs.

Maroons by the victory pulled into a third place tie with Montreal Canadiens in National Hockey League's Canadian Section. Red Wings could have got out of the United States Division cellar by winning tonight, but they could not crack the Maroon defence. The defeat before 8,819 spectators, was the Detroiters' sixth in nine games.

Russ Blinco scored his first goal of the year to put the Montrealers ahead at 11:19 of the opening period. Baldy Northcott and Earl Robinson added Montreal's other pair midway in the second period.

The lone goal of the champions came at 18:49 of the final goal. A four-man rush gave veteran Hec Kilrea a chance to poke home a short shot from the left flank.
