At the Tea-Hour

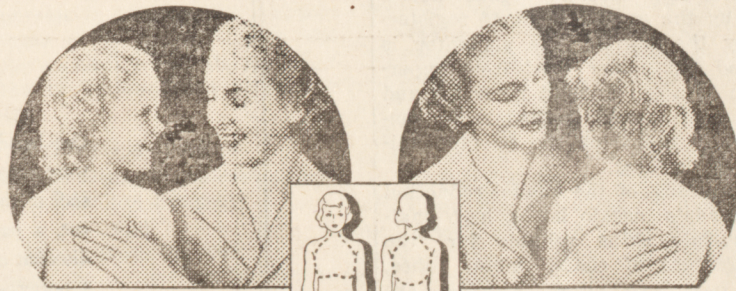

capable of housing fifty-six patients. The original ground floor as already constructed will contain store rooms and staff's toilets and facilities of a similar nature. The two upper floors to be built will contain, in addition to the wards and porches, the usual facilities as diet kitchen, patients' bathroom and the accessory rooms that go to make up a normal nursing unit.

The building is to be of fireproof construction throughout with linoleum finish floor, terrazzo base and hospital trim and finish throughout.

Build Home Next Year

"It is also the intention," continued the Premier, "to build next summer a nurses' home capable of housing thirty nurses as a distinct and separate unit from the infirmary proper and located on the north side of the main building. This building will be of wood frame construction, two storeys high, built in the nature of a large house in order to be attractive and home-like rather than a building of the institutional character originally intended. The cost will not exceed \$20,000. Thus, with the additional expense of some \$22,000, we have modified the original plan of our predecessors and will have secured in addition to the nurses' home a hospital unit which will increase the bed capacity of the Jordan Memorial Sanatorium from 110 to 166. We have also changed to fireproof construction which we regard as essential, particularly in a hospital.

"Kenneth Campbell of Fredericton is the architect in charge of the work. He has had wide experience in this kind of construction."

**COMMUNICATION BETWEEN SHANGHAI
AND REST OF CHINA IS CUT OFF TODAY**

SHANGHAI, Nov. 29—Shanghai was cut off from telegraphic communication with the rest of China today as Japanese officials, having seized control of the Chinese telegraph and radio channels linking the city with the interior, ordered service suspended.

They said measures thus far taken to place collection of the hitherto rich Shanghai customs receipts in Japanese hands constituted the first part of a program for Japanese control. Later, they declared, the question of payment of China's foreign debts out of customs receipts, according to the terms of loans, would be studied and rights of foreign powers considered.

Shortly before this occurred, incoming messages reported a score of Britons and Americans were endangered and hundreds of Chinese killed or wounded as Japanese air forces struck at vital points around China's evacuated capital, Nanking.

When 114 bombs were dropped on Chinkiang, important Yangtze River port 40 miles east of Nanking, the small British and American colony took refuge on the British gunboat Aphis, lying in the river. No foreigners were hurt.

Japanese diplomats admitted the United States and Great Britain had
