eration in putting the policies of the department into practice throughout the province.

"I believe there is a great future for agriculture in New Brunswick," he said, as he placed the facilities of his department at the service of the farmers of the province.

About 70 delegates and guests were present at the luncheon of the Council today, at which the government members spoke.

The council, composed of 53 delegates, one from each of the herd improvement associations in the province, met for the first business session in the afternoon.

The business of the afternoon session included addresses by the following: H. N. Flewelling, supervisor of the N. B. department of agriculture, who will speak on "Variation of the Butterfat Content in Milk;" Dr. L. A. Donovan, veterinary surgeon of Saint John, whose topic will be "Some Non-contagious Diseases found in Dairy Cattle;" Dr. J. P. Atkins, provincial veterinarian on the subject "Some Contagious Diseases found in Dairy Cattle;" Thomas G. Hetherington, director of agriculture extension, N. B. department of agriculture, who will speak on "Farm Planning and Farm Management," and J. K. King, deputy minister of agriculture for New Brunswick.

Following the addresses there was discussion on technical subjects in relation to the improvement of dairy herds in New Brunswick.

President Earle E. Lister, Harvey Station, occupied the chair. Other officers of the council are: Vice-president, W. H. Huggard, Norton; secretary, H. N. Flewelling; directors, Isale Melanson, St. Paul; Lloyd Sloat, Keswick; and James Douglas, Petitcodiac.

Visit U.N.B.

This morning the members visited the University of New Brunswick, where they were addressed by J. G. Wright, Ottawa, in charge of the fire hazard research work being done by the Dominion Forest Service. The party then proceeded to the U.N.B. forest land, where the work being done here at the station was explained. This afternoon the members of the society returned to the Acadia forest Experimental Station, where they examined broadcast seeding experiments following which they left for their homes.

Besides Mr. Creighton, the officers of the society are: president, Prof. J. M. Gibson, dean of the forestry faculty at U.N.B.; and councillors C. C. Atkinson, Edmundston; L. A. Nix, Bathurst; G. L.
