## Five Million For Permanent CHRISTCHURCH Road Program

The Government of New Brunswick has completed arrangements with a syndicate of Canadian investment dealers and bankers for the sale of six million five hundred thousand dollars Province of New Brunswick derentures, it was announced today by Premier A.A. The purpose of the issue is to provide slightly more than five million dollars for hardsurfacing and for permanent roads, nine hundred and ten thousand dollars to retire debentures falling due Jan. 1, 1938, to provide for unemployment assistance projects, floating debt and minor capital expenditure on the Provincial Building, Saint

The syndicate handling the issue is headed by the Dominion Security Corporation. Ltd., and Bell, Gouin-
