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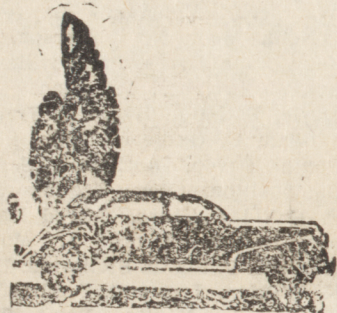
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WEST'S NEED FOR RELIEF TRAGICALLY OBVIOUS

Minister of Labor Thus Sums Up His Impressions Of Visit To "Indomitable" Prairie Provinces

WINNIPEG, Aug. 10—Need for 100 per cent direct relief is 'tragically obvious,' Hon. Norman Rogers, Federal Minister of Labor, said here following a trip through the drought areas of Alberta and Saskatchewan.

"Scarcity of feed for live stock has been somewhat relieved by recent rains, but large-scale relief measures such as already are under way will have to be carried out," he said.

"It was a thrilling and encouraging experience to encounter such an indomitable spirit as that which prevails among the people in dried out areas. In the face of such courage and confidence and the past productive history of the areas, it would seem both unwise and impracticable to undertake any large-scale depopulation measures.

"There is widespread belief this year marks the end of the present drought cycle, and heavy fall rains are in prospect. While recognizing and responding to this hope, the government realizes there may be other periods of drought. Regardless of hopes for improvement next year, a long range policy must be adopted with a view to establishment of a second line of defense in the form of irrigation and pasture and land classification measures, which will put rehabilitation efforts on a more or less permanent basis."

POLICE SEEK VANDALS AFTER TRAIN DERAILED

Passengers Shaken Up As Engine Leaves Track

CARLETON PLACE, Ill., Aug. 10—Railroad detectives and Clinton County officers hunted clues today to plotters who they said derailed a Baltimore & Ohio passenger train last night as it sped 200 passengers across a high-way underpass near here enroute to St. Louis.

Minor bruises were the only injuries reported from what trainmen called 'an apparent attempt to wreck the train.' They said unofficially they believed cranks caused wreck. A heavy steel 'fish' plate, found still fastened atop the rail, was blamed directly for the derailment which sent the engine and tender plunging down a 20-foot embankment.

ONTARIO TO ALTER FRENCH LESSONS

Plans To Have Pupils Learn To Use Tongue For Conversation

LAKE COUCHICHING, Ont., Aug. 10—The Ontario Department of Education intends to change the teaching of the French language in the schools 'so pupils may learn to use it for practical conversation.' Dr. Duncan McArthur, Deputy Minister of Education, said here yesterday at the Canadian Institute of Economics

and Politics. He told the Geneva Park Conference that he expected no opposition to bilingualism.

"I think a very definite change has come about in the attitude of a large number of English people who are neighbors of French-speaking Canadians regarding the necessity of learning French," he said.

"The trouble is that the only place in many Ontario counties where English children hear a word of French spoken is in the classrooms and they are too busy learning the grammar of the language to learn how to use it in conversation. We hope to make certain changes so that less attention will be paid in the earlier stages of teaching French to the dry structure of the grammar."

COUGHLIN ASSAILS C.I.O. MOVEMENT

Organization Stands for Class Ascendancy, Says Radio Priest

CHICAGO, Aug. 10—Rev. Charles E. Coughlin, Detroit radio priest, on Sunday denounced the Committee for Industrial Organization and said 'by the salient fact that it stands for class ascendancy, the C.I.O. runs counter to Christian teaching.'

In an open letter to the clergy in his newspapers 'Social Justice,' Coughlin declared:

"It is certain that the entire C.I.O. movement, insofar as it is now political, is hostile to the dicta of Leo XIII and Pius XI, namely, labor needs capital and capital needs labor."

"If Communism and its philosophy will be conquered in America, we Christian Americans must not content ourselves by advocating that our people join the suspect C.I.O. in order to convert it. Nor shall we be content to advocate the 5 and 10 cents hour wage raise which the C.I.O. proposes, while the purchasing power of the dollar more than assimilates all the pseudo-gains resulting from strikes. Nor shall we be content to hold up the right hand of the C.I.O., as, before your eyes, it is going through the metamorphosis of becoming a political party."

The tax legislation of the nine provinces of Canada shows so wide variation that Companies having branches of their business in a number of provinces experience considerable difficulty in keeping informed on the conflicting requirements of the various taxing authorities. Since annual returns must be filed by the companies, it is important that the officials and the auditors of these companies keep themselves posted on the subject. To meet this need, the Dominion Association of Chartered Accountants has recently prepared for its members and for any others applying therefor a summary of provincial tax legislation in force in Canada with respect to corporations and individuals, and plans to keep this information up to date by making a final summary each year of the amendments of the several acts for that year.

BRITISH SOLDIERS TO GET PENSION

LONDON, Aug. 10—Soldiers in the British Army are to receive a pension after twenty-one years of service. They are to be given an opportunity to finish twenty-one years. The military course is to be a long term career and the soldiers leaving the army will have special privilege not enjoyed by other ranks and files of unemployment. The British Army however, will be twenty-five thousand men short by the end of next May. 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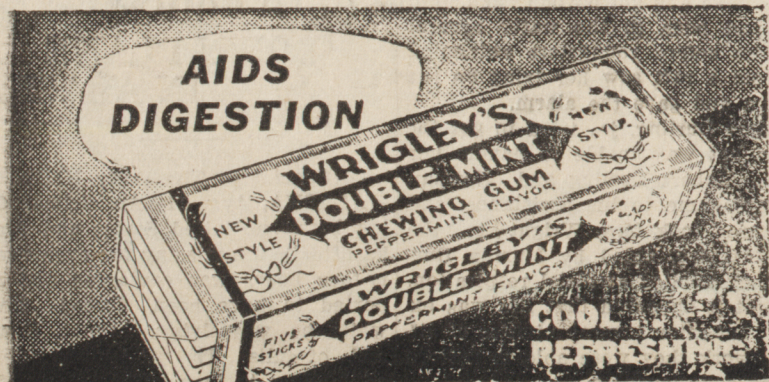
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
