MacKinnon, Saint John, secretary.

HISTORICAL TOURS PARTY VISITS CITY

A party of motorists, comprising the "Canadian Historical Tours" was in Fredericton last evening while enroute to the upper sections of the Saint John river. Headed by Charles W. Jeffreys, prominent Canadian artist, and MacDonald Oxley, Toronto, the enterprise has a two-fold purpose; revitalizing Canadian history and creating a greater inter-provincial understanding.

While the present is an inaugural one, the historical tours will not be confined to trips from Upper Canada to the Maritimes but will embrace similar tours from the Maritimes to the upper provinces. Mr. Oxley stated last evening.

Mr. Jeffreys, who is Canada's best known historical artist, is acting as commentator and guide in the tour which includes all the major and many of the minor sites of historical interest in all sections of Canada.

"The idea is to make a personal acquaintance with places of historical interest," Mr. Jeffreys said.

Mine Representative Is Making Survey Of Maritimes

MARKET PROSPECTS

Visiting eastern Canada for the purpose of ascertaining possible sources for lumber used in timbering mine shafts, H. B. Atkinson, Newcastle-on-Tyne, England, arrived in the city this morning. Speaking to newspapermen, the visitor stated that although the extent of his survey does not yet permit him to express a definite opinion, he said that there is every possibility that the Maritimes could supply a large quantity of the type of timber mentioned. Asked if such a trade could be developed to any appreciable extent, Mr. Atkinson expressed the belief that great possibilities do exist in that regard.

He is representing the South Yorkshire Trade Association which is interested in ascertaining knowledge of the supply of the required timber which exists in the eastern provinces. At the present time the chief source of supply for lumber used in British coal mining operations is Russia and Finland. The mining officials in the Mother Country are hopeful to transfer a portion of this trade to Canada. At the present time a shipment of "pit" timber is being loaded at New- (Continued on Page Five)

CAMERAMEN WILL TAKE PICTURES IN FREDERICTON

Director Lowell Thomas Travelogue In the City

Many of the historic beauty spots of the city will be filmed as a sequence to the Lowell Thomas Travelogue which is being made at present, according to R. W. Barton, director of the film. Interviewed this morning, Mr. Barton stated that he has been much impressed by the beauty of the city and has found many of the old landmarks of deep historic interest. For this reason he believes that a series of "shots" taken in the city will add greatly to the film's interest.

He wishes to get pictures of the tree shaded streets, and the city from the river, especially Waterloo Row. The Cathedral, in its natural setting will also be taken, as well as the Parliament Buildings and grounds. Shots of the University of New Brunswick buildings and campus will be taken, and prominent buildings in the city such as the Post Office and Customs House, the County Court House. Pictures of Queen Street business activity, will also be included.

Mr. Barton spoke especially of Bliss Carman's home, pictures of which will be one of the interesting highlights of the film. He also spoke of the splendid university, which has turned out so many famous men, such as Bliss Carman, Sir Charles G. D. Roberts and others.

Films of St. Andrew's and Grand Manan areas have already been taken, as well as scenes on the river in the vicinity of the city, following the scenes in the city, the party will move up river, getting shots on the Tobique, and then will go over to the Restigouche and Kedgwick.

At present the work is tied up due to poor light conditions. A slight haze in the sky will not permit getting the finest shots, and Mr. Barton is waiting for clearer heavens.

SEVERAL HUNDRED ATTEND OPENING PROGRAM TODAY

Formal Ceremony This Afternoon --- The Speakers

THREE DAYS

Farmers from all sections of the surrounding counties as well as a large number of visitors from other sections of the province and outside points gathered at the Dominion Experimental Station here this morning to take part in the program which marked the opening of the annual Field Day. Although the formal opening does not take place until this afternoon, the three-day program got underway this morning.

The spacious grounds of the federal property were dotted with tents in which the demonstrations on different phases of activity carried out by the various branches of the provincial and federal agriculture departments are being held. Although the number of visitors present this morning did not exceed 500, it is expected that the number will reach the 1,000 mark when Hon. Murray MacLaren, C.M.G., lieutenant-governor, officially opens the program this afternoon.

This morning's activities included an inspection of livestock and poultry, conducted by Leonard Griesbach, Herbert Little and J. Rankine; Percheron horse demonstration, conducted by C. F. Bailey and Dr. J. T. Akins; horse-shoeing demonstration, conducted by Dr. Akins and W. A. Magee; live stock judging contests by Stanley Wood, Leonard Griesbach, Robert Little and T. G. Hetherington.

Following the formal opening at 1:30 o'clock, Hon. A. C. Taylor, minister of agriculture, will extend a welcome on behalf of the government. He will also deliver an address relative to the program and agricultural development being carried on by the government. His address will be followed by a discourse on "Swine Feeding Methods based on Experimental Trials" by Leonard Griesbach. C. F. Bailey will discuss "Pasture Improvement," while an address on "Cereal and Forage Crops" will be given by J. M. McKenzie. The final address of the afternoon will be given by T. C. Hetherington, who will discuss the various phases of farm management.

The present light condition could be utilized, he stated, but since it is the object of the party to secure the finest pictures possible, he has decided to wait for a few days if necessary, before resuming the film. A thunder shower, he believes, would clear the sky and permit further activity.

The party has been in the province for three weeks now and does not expect to conclude the film before the first of September.

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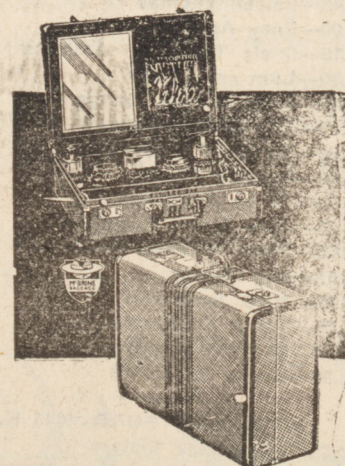
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
