## MANY ITALIAN OFFICERS KILLED IN ABYSSINIA

(Special to The Daily Mail)

NAPLES, Oct. 14.—Seven thousand more Italian troops were embarked on three liners leaving Naples today for Libya. This will strengthen the Italian forces at this point to four divisions and will include nearly six thousand men. This will be as many men as Italy had in Abyssinia at the time of the conquest.

One official report from Rome reports that ninety-nine officers, N. C. O.'s and other officers were killed in September. Sixty-six workmen were killed while working on the roads project. All casualties occurring during conflicts with tribesmen.

Another dispatch puts the number of officers killed to forty-one and several Italian soldiers killed. The number of Ethiopians killed is not reported but it is said to be great.

Under the existing arrangement the provinces administer the act through agreements with the Dominion which provide that the federal government pays 75 per cent of the pensions and the provinces the remaining 25 per cent and running expenses. The scheme has been applicable to all provinces since New Brunswick started participating July 1, 1936, and Quebec August 1 the same year.

Estimates for this fiscal year which ends next March 31 placed the Dominion's share of old age pensions costs at \$27,000,000, compared with an expenditure in the last fiscal period of \$21,149,351 for 146,524 pensioners.

### CAR AND WAGGON COLLIDE
